Livestock

MONTREAL, Jan. 3—(CP)—There were 159 cattle, 6 sheep and lambs, 275 hogs and 125 calves for sale on Montreal livestock markets today.

Cattle were slow and other classes of livestock were unchanged.

Fresh receipts were made up of mostly cows of common to medium quality. Medium quality cows were \$4.25 to \$5 with common butchers from \$3.50 to \$4. Canners and cutters were mostly \$3. Common bulls made \$4 to \$4.50 with fle-hy bulls up to \$5.

Veal calves were from \$8.50 to \$11. There were no top. The bulk of the veals were between \$9.50 and \$10.25. Grassers were mostly \$5.

A few good lambs made \$10 and sheep \$4.25 to \$5.

Bacon hogs were \$9.35, fed and watered. Selects drew \$1 premium with the regular cuts on off grades. Sows were \$6.50 to \$7. Hogs sold on rail grade brought \$12.40 hot weight.

On Maritime markets rail grade hogs were steady at \$11.90 hot weight and sows at \$7.70 hot weight.

Good steers sold at \$7, medium \$6.25, fair \$5.50, common \$3.50 to \$4. Choice heifers \$6.50, good \$5 medium \$5.50, fair \$5, common \$3.50 to \$4. Good cow \$3.35, medium \$1.25, fair \$3.50, Canners and cutters \$2 to \$3 boning bulls \$3 to \$3.25, butcher bulls \$3.50 to \$4.50. Veal calves ranged from \$4 for grassers to \$6.50 for good veals. Lambs sold from \$5 to \$9.50.

GRAIN

CHICAGO, Jan. 3—(AP)—After moving uncertainly above and below previous closing levels during much of the session wheat futures weakened today and lost nearly 1-2 cents a bushel at times.

Wheat closed 3-8—7-8 lower, May 108 1-8—1-4, July 103 3-4—7-8. Corn unchanged to 1-8 down, May 59 3-8—1-2, July 59 3-4; Oats unchanged to 1-8 higher.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 3—(CP)—Weakness on outside markets induced light selling during the last half of today's session on Winnipeg grain exchange and showed wheat futures prices 1-7-8 cent below the previous close. Trading was slow and nervous as May wheat finished at 89 5-8 and July at 90 1-2 cents a bushel.

Observers failed to discover any definite reason for the weakness which dropped wheat prices about a cent at both Chicago and Buenos Aires.
