**Upper Chamber  
 Rejects Old Age  
 Pensions Bill**

OTTAWA, Ont., June 8.—By a vote of 46 to 21 the Senate tonight rejected the Old Age Pensions Bill on the second reading. Hon. Gideon Robertson voted with the Liberals, while Sir Alan Aylesworth, Hon. J. C. Turriff and Hon. J. J. Hughes voted for the Conservatives. Only three Quebec Liberal Senators registered their votes, the others abstaining from the measure. During the debate of nearly five hours only three Government supporters, Hon. Raoul Dandurand, Hon. John Lewis and Hon. N. A. Belcourt, defended this measure, which was openly stated as the price the Government paid for the support of the two Communists in the Commons, Messrs. Woodsworth and Heaps. It was one of the best debates heard in the Senate in recent years. Opposition to the measure was based chiefly on the ground that it was an infringement of Provincial

rights, that it was unjust and unfair to the Maritime Provinces, unable through financial reasons to participate in the scheme, that it was unnecessary in Canada as it was in the United States and also that it was a hastily devised measure for political purposes and not for the object intended. Many of the Senators, including Sir George E. Foster, objected to the absence of the personal contributory principle in the measure. Last year a special commission of the House of Commons spent months investigating this problem. After this exhaustive inquiry they especially recommended that no action be taken until the Government consulted a conference of the Provincial Premiers. This was agreed to by the Government last session. This year without consulting the Provincial Premiers who are now in Ottawa, the Government hastily drafted the present measure. Not one Province asked for the bill and only one, British Columbia, intimated that it might participate in the scheme if it became law.

**Yield of Meal Tax Exceeds Estimate**

QUEBEC, June 13.—Though the revenues from the new tax on meals cannot yet be established with certainty by reason of the unusual activity in the hotels of the Province, the first ten days since the enforcement of the new law indicate that the returns will be much more than what was first estimated. Requests received from the hospitals show that their need is great, and it is hoped by the provincial officials who are collecting the tax, that at least half a million dollars will be made available. In the course of the last three days, in this city alone, it is believed that about \$1,200 was collected from the tax, while Montreal contributed more than ten times that amount. Important changes are expected to be made to the law at the next session, so as to permit the levy of the tax on all meals, whether served in hotels or elsewhere, so as to get revenue from the trains, hotels and clubs. The Chateau Frontenac up to now has not charged the tax to its guests, but pays it directly.

**Budget Alterations Back Stairs Retreat**

WINNIPEG, Man., June 8.—(R.I.) Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader, and leader of the Opposition in the House of Commons, told the Manitoba Conservative Association's annual convention to-night that adjustments made in the budget within recent days had come to carry on with a minority of his supporters in the House "and led level at which it had been before the budget was introduced. The removal of the five per cent. luxury tax, announced Monday, he said, was equal to increasing the duty on low-price cars to 27 per cent. Mr. Meighen spoke for an hour. Of all the deeds of the King administration, its position on the tariff was the most malodorous, he declared. The Prime Minister had declared he would never attack the tariff said the debate had come when except after a full investigation by an independent tribunal. But seeing what has happened the first session. "He took his pledge," threw it behind his back, trampled it under his feet, and slashed at the tariff. Members from Saskatchewan had stood up in the House and told where they stood, and the pledge was forgotten. Delegations had visited Ottawa against the cut in automobile duties and were told there would be no change in the budget. He, himself, had asked on the floor of the House if there would be any alterations, and had, at first, been told there would not, and later told there would be nothing substantial. Then came the alterations in the duty on raw material, which, perhaps, meant little to the people of the country, but had meant millions to the automobile manufacturers. This has been followed by the removal of the luxury tax, which affords the manufacturers further protection. These changes, said Mr. Meighen, affect the revenues of the country, and are a back stairs retreat in the hope that the people of the country would not see it. He had no objection to the restoration, which brought the protection to the industry nearly to the point at which it had been before the budget had been introduced, but this sort of thing should be done in the open, and frankly, and not by subterfuge.

He is certain that plenty of Moet and Chandon champagne is getting to the United States. "Naturally, we're not selling as much champagne to the United States as we did before prohibition became effective," said Moet. "But lots of it gets there all the same. I don't know how. I get orders to ship by way of Havre, and other places. Somebody else does the rest. "Anybody with money in New York gets all the champagne that he wants. If some of them use it in both tubs in New York, it's all the same to me."
