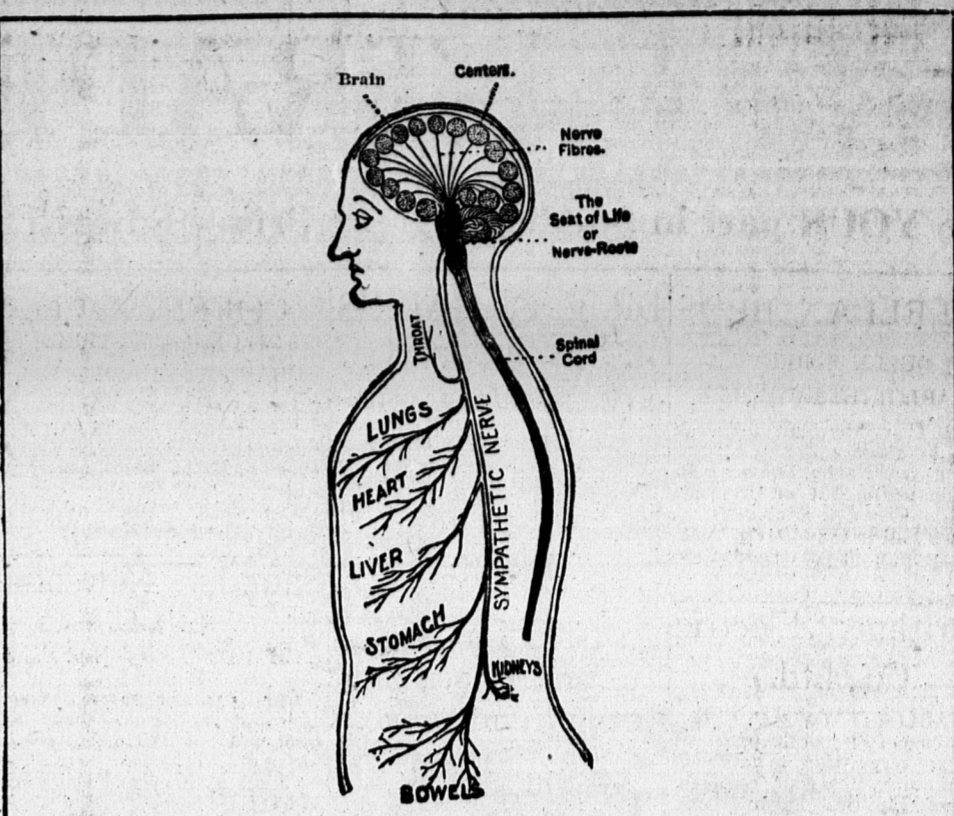

RECITAL ENJOYED.—The first public entertainment for some time was the recital in St. James Hall on Tuesday evening. A large audience greeted Mr. Watkis and Miss Bell and the hearty applause showed their appreciation of the splendid programme so carefully arranged. Mr. Watkis' rendition of masterpieces from Liszt and McDowell showed his genius as a musician and was a rare treat to the sympathetic audience present. WON MILITARY MEDAL.—Mr. W. H. Hogan, Hope River has received notice from Ottawa that his son, Sgt. J. H. Hogan, 8th Siege Battery has been awarded the Military Medal for gallantry on the field of battle. Sgt. Hogan, it will be remembered, was severely gassed on May 31st, the memorable night on which so many other Islanders suffered similarly among them his brother, Gunner L. D. Hogan. Both these young men are now in England undergoing treatment, and it is pleasing to note, both concurring favorably. The Hogan boys it will also be remembered, are two of triplets, the third, James A. E. being at home on the farm and "keeping the home fires burning." The fact that there is no break in this happy trio is it is unnecessary to say, a source of great consolation and gratitude to Mr. and Mrs. Hogan and family and in their happiness they will have the hearty congratulations of their many friends.

MEMORIAL SERVICE.—A very impressive memorial service was held in Highfield Church on Sunday Oct. 13th in memory of Pte. John W. Sanderson who made the supreme sacrifice on the blood stained fields of France. Despite the fact that influenza was prevalent in the neighborhood the church was comfortably filled with a sympathetic audience. The Union Jack and stars and Stripes was twined back of the platform while a Union Jack was draped over the desk out of respect for the fallen hero. The sermon for the occasion was ably preached by the Rev. D. McLean pastor of the Church who took for his text the words: For with thee is the fountain of life in thy light shall we see light Psalm 36.9. From which the speaker explained to his hearers clearly how scriptures are being fulfilled in this great war and spoke words of comfort to his parents and brothers that are left to mourn. Greater love hath no man than this: that a man lay down his life for his friends.
