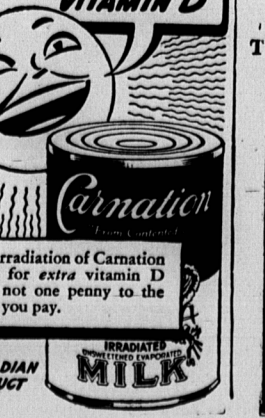

Germans Loss Of Shipping Heavy In April

LONDON, May 7—(CP)—Since April 1 the Germans have lost 300,000 tons of merchant shipping, raising the total estimated enemy losses in mercantile shipping since the start of the war to 800,000 gross tons, the Admiralty announced today.

Most of the ships lost since April 1 were sunk during Norwegian operations, it said. The vessels included transport and supply ships. Total losses from war causes represent about 15 per cent of Germany's pre-war tonnage. German merchant tonnage definitely accounted for as captured, sunk or scuttled now amounts to 454,000 tons, the Admiralty said. In addition it was estimated that a further 30 unidentified ships of approximately 150,000 tons have been sunk by Allied submarines, mines and aircraft.

According to reports from Rotterdam the German motorship Robert Ley, 27,288 tons, was sunk in the Skagerrak on the night of April 12-13. This was the famous "strength through joy" ship which took Nazis on health cruises and which, a year or so ago, called at London. During the week which ended midnight April 28 four British ships of a total tonnage of 6,688 were sunk by enemy action and one Allied ship of 1,458 tons and two

small neutral ships also were sunk. Under new procedure, the names of these British ships are not reported. The success of the Allied campaign, the announcement said, may be measured by the fact that British, Allied and neutral ships had been convoyed, with a loss of 31 ships. French convoys up to the same date had escorted 3,457 ships, with a loss of seven. The British and French have convoyed 22,555 ships since the war began, with a loss ratio of one in 594. Anti-aircraft fire from one ship brought down at least four enemy planes and damaged others. Another vessel escorting troop trans-

ports shot down five enemy planes within three days. The announcement said that as far as is known in official quarters no enemy units are now in Narvik or in Norwegian waters. BRITISH LOSSES IN AIRCRAFT LONDON, May 7—(CP)—Reuters News Agency computed that Britain lost 48 aircraft on all fronts in the last four weeks and Germany "for certain" lost 138 in the same period. In addition, 97 German planes "were probably destroyed or put out of action for some time," the Ag-

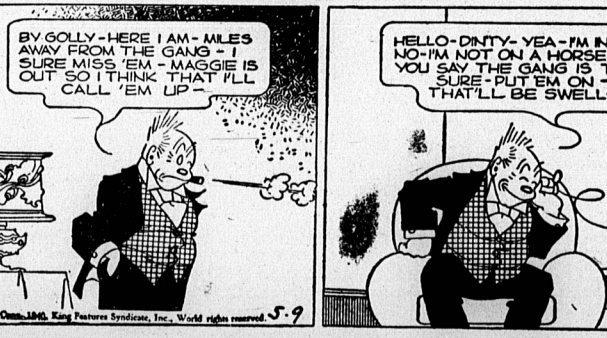
