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Life Of Italy's Premier Threatened

TRANS-ATLANTIC FLYER BELIEVED LOST Frustrates Plan To Assassinate Prem. Mussolini

Atlantic Claims Another Victim

No Word Of Stan Hausner, Polish-American Flyer Who Hopped Off On Trans-Ocean Flight On Friday Last — Is Believed Lost.

(Associated Press) LONDON, June 5—Europe was anxious tonight as no word was heard of Stanislaus F. Hausner, Polish-American flyer missing since he leaped over the Atlantic alone Friday with Warsaw as his goal. His fate remained unknown to Poland, France and Great Britain.

Warsaw was greatly worried over the complete absence of news from the young adventurer since he left New York, said a dispatch from the Polish Capital.

Air authorities there repeatedly telephoned to various European airfields, but in vain. Hausner's family, said friends, eagerly awaited news from the over-due aviator at their homes near Warsaw.

No word of his progress from any point at sea or on land had reached England since he started on his great adventure and Le Bourget field, near Paris, also reported no news.

New Socialist Gov't. For Chile

Revolutionary Junta Seize Power And Force President Montero To Resign With His Cabinet.

(Associated Press) SANTIAGO, Chile, June 5—The revolutionary junta that deposed President Juan Esteban Montero yesterday moved swiftly today to rebuild the government structure along Socialist lines under provisional President Carlos Davies. It prepared numerous decrees enabling the "first Socialist Republic of Chile" to take over immediately the productive forces of the nation, redistribute wealth by the imposition of confiscatory taxes on large incomes and seize various private capitalistic enterprises, foreign or domestic.

Alarm was expressed in foreign industrial, business and commercial quarters at the declaration of a government spokesman that "we must get Chile out from under the yoke of Capitalism, whether foreign or domestic, but chiefly foreign domination."

The foreigners said they expected wholesale seizures of their property.

Committee Makes Report Re United Church Protest

(Associated Press) ROME, June 5—A frustrated plan to assassinate Premier Benito Mussolini was revealed today with announcement that a young Italian, armed with a pistol and two bombs, had been arrested outside the office of Il Duce in the Palazzo Venezia.

The would-be assassin, who was arrested yesterday, confessed that he sought to kill the Premier during the Garibaldi anniversary celebration because Garibaldi was a symbol of liberty, the police announced.

The first announcement of the arrest, made by the official government press bureau today, said the man was a 25-year-old Italian whose name was Angelo Sbardellotto. He carried a Swiss passport, which bore the name of Angela Gabini, but the press bureau said

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Earthquakes Take Heavy Life Toll

Mexico Rocked By Violent Quakes — 400 Persons Reported Dead Or Injured.

(Associated Press) MEXICO CITY, June 5—More than 400 persons were reported dead or injured as a result of severe earthquakes that shook Mexico Friday.

Reports trickling into Mexico City over damaged communications systems said at least 300 were killed or hurt in the area about Guadalupe, with the death toll still mounting.

Thousands were found to be homeless in remote sections of the back country. Organization of local relief commissions to speed aid to the victims was ordered by authorities. Fearing recurrence of the shocks, officials forbade indoor

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Dissatisfied With British Police System

LONDON, June 5. (By Thomas T. Champion, Canadian Press Staff Writer)—Uneasiness concerning the organization and administration of the police system in Great Britain has for some time been apparent, and present indications point to the introduction of certain reforms before long.

An undercurrent of unrest has arisen since Lord Trenchard, former chief of the Royal Air Force staff, who still holds the rank of Air-Marshal, was appointed Commissioner of Police. In particular it seems that the creation of a force of special constables, who undertake voluntary work in association with the regular body, has created dissatisfaction.

Youth Killed In Accident On Ball Field

Patrick Flynn, Aged Nine, Fatally Injured By Baseball Bat.

A fatal accident occurred about 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon at Victoria Park. It seems that a baseball game, witnessed by a number of young lads, was in progress when the bat slipped from the hands of the batter, striking a young lad, Patrick Flynn, a spectator, on the side of the head, who dropped to the ground. Thought to be seriously hurt, he was rushed to the Poly-clinic, thence to the City Hospital, where he was found to be suffering from a fractured skull. All that medical skill could do was of no avail. The young lad, but nine years old, passed away about 10 o'clock Saturday night. The deceased was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Flynn, 39 Prince Street.

An inquest into the cause of the death will be held this evening at 8 o'clock, in the City Court room.

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, June 5. (Canadian Press Cable)—The government tonight announced it had appointed delegates to represent the Free State at the Ottawa Imperial Economic Conference. Sources close to the government said they understood President Eamon De Valera and 17 others, including advisers, would go to Ottawa.

Search For Missing Flyers

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., June 5. (By the Canadian Press)—Charlie Hubbard, who flew here from Boston with two companions to aid in the search for Pilot Arthur Sullivan and Dr. Karl Kuehnert, took off from St. Anthony today to investigate the possibility that the missing flyers came down on one of the lakes near Battle Harbor, last Monday night.

Reports today were that people at Battle Harbor and Fox Harbor had heard a plane's motor at 10 o'clock on the night Sullivan and Kuehnert disappeared. The two missing flyers had left St. Anthony on a pleasure flight at 8:30 p. m. Battle Harbor is some 75 miles north of St. Anthony, across the water.

NEW STEAMSHIP SERVICE IS INAUGURATED

Freighter Morris S. Tremaine of Buffalo, with a crew of 28 and a cargo of coal, is on the rocks of South Fox Island, 30 miles off this port in Lake Michigan.

United States coast guard boats from three stations and two other craft were dispatched to aid the freighter, which sent out an S O S message last night stating that the forepeak and no. 1 hold on the starboard side were full of water.

Coast guardsmen expressed the opinion that, since the water was comparatively calm, the crew was in no immediate danger. There was a heavy fog, the freighter's distress call reported.
