## PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

(Translated from La Patrie, October 21.)

Thirty eight years after having joined Confederation, Prince Edward Island today numbers exactly the same population it did when it consented to become a Canadian Province.

Since the census of 1871 when the Islanders numbered 94022 the Islands population has varied as follows:—

1871	94,022
1881	108,891
1891	109,078
1901	103,259
1911	93,722

In view of this fact this little Province has no reason to congratulate itself for having given up its autonomy. From 1873 to 1881 it has good reason to be satisfied, but in the second decade its increase of population was scarcely perceptible, and since 1881 the Island's population has rapidly decreased.

And yet P. E. Island is not without those things that go towards bringing prosperity to the other Provinces. From many standpoints it offers inducements which are particularly its own. Its soil is on all sides undulating, without mountains and without deep depressions. It is watered by numerous beautiful rivers. Its shores indented like lace is infinitely picturesque and seductive.

The Island also possesses abundant natural wealth. Its soil is fertile and it had in 1900, 1,365,760 acres of land under cultivation. It has numerous gardens and excellent orchards. Cattle raising has met with success and its Fisheries are a source of unlimited wealth.

With proper cultivation its oyster areas would produce an immense revenue for the Island. The home of the "Malpeques" the most sought for oyster in the world, and of other oysters almost equally good. Its manufactures, as yet in their infancy, are capable of vast development.

What then prevents this little province from making equal progress with the other Provinces.

We can discover but one reason—the lack of proper communication with the rest of the Continent. During a great part of the year the Islanders are, although within a short distance from the Mainland, more isolated than if in mid-ocean. As soon as winter comes on, they, to a great extent, lose contact with the other parts of Canada, owing to the drift-ice which continually obstructs navigation in the Straits of Northumberland. Winter communications which are supposed to be continuous are frequently interrupted by the winter boats becoming stuck for weeks at a time in the ice.

Formerly when an Islander desired to cross to the Mainland he had to ask leave of the Governor. It would today seem necessary to enforce this old law in order to put an end to the Island's yearly exodus.

A tunnel under the Straits of Northumberland, so long promised by the Federal Government, would seem to be the only appropriate remedy for the evils from which this little Province suffers. Each year the project makes its bow to the House of Commons but at its last appearance it looked further than ever of being realized.

Now that we have a prime Minister, a native of the Maritime Provinces, the Government may be inclined to extend more sympathy to the Islanders and may do what is necessary in order that the progress of Canada may not stop at the Straits of Northumberland but extend to the extreme limit of Prince Edward Island.

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## THE CHANGES IN BRITISH CABINET

NEW YORK, October, 24—A London cable to the Tribune says: "The British cabinet undergoes a remarkable degree of reconstruction as a result of the ministerial appointments announced last night. The changes are almost bewildering, but one general principle underlies them all, that of transferring to another post any minister who has failed to come up to the expectations in the office held by him."

"The greatest surprise is the exchange of offices between Winston Churchill and Reginald McKenna. Mr. Churchill incurred the enmity of the labor party during the railway strike, while Mr. McKenna by his failure to keep down naval expenditures had alienated the confidence of the little Englanders. It is perhaps significant that Mr. Churchill should have taken what is commonly regarded as an inferior cabinet position after holding the secretaryship of state for the home department, which comes next in titular precedence to the dignities of the prime minister and the chancellor of the exchequer, but it is not forgotten that he has been years ago Joseph Chamberlain chosen the colonial office, which stands sixth in precedence. He clearly saw the great role which issues of imperial policy would play, and because he recognized that the South African question was calling for settlement. It is possible that Mr. Churchill's decision to accept the admiralty may have a similar significance."

**WILL GIVE THE HOME HER \$50,000**  
BOSTON, October, 23—Mrs. Pantha Brown of Nova Scotia, who is now in the Old Ladies Home in Gloucester, Mass., has just received news that her share of her brother's estate is about \$50,000, but the aged woman will not leave the place that had sheltered her for nine long years. Instead, she says, she will pay in the future far her board at the home, and on her death will leave the bulk of her unexpected fortune to the fund that provides for aged women, whose position is the same as hers at the time she entered the Gloucester Ladies' Home.

The sudden change in Mrs. Brown's financial prospects came with the death of her brother, Rev. Charles F. Myers of New York. Mrs. Brown had not seen her brother for several years. He also left \$25,000 to Acadia college, in Nova Scotia, and made bequests of \$1,000 to each number of relatives. The news came as a surprise to her, she said:

"Even though my brother has left me \$50,000, I shall remain here in the home, because it has been a real home to me for nine years. I am now 78 years old. At my age I do not care to travel and my chief pleasure outside of enjoying the comforts of this home and the only way I shall make use of my money will be to make an occasional trip to the department stores. I shall have the opportunity to buy a few Christmas presents for my friends."

Mrs. Brown's nephew and niece, who are residing in Nova Scotia, will also get about \$50,000 each.

**VICE IN CITIES MUST BE FOUGHT**  
MONTREAL, October, 22—Home missions were the main discussion at this evening's session of the Baptist conference at Olivet Church, and the speakers throughout carried out the Baptist idea of hitting straight out, just as President Holman had on the opening night. City conditions were powerfully dealt with by Rev. Wm. M. Corkery of Hamilton. Discussing this phase of religious work, Mr. Corkery declared that civic ignorance in moral and social reform so far as they were impelled by the kicks of public opinion. Canadian and other cities, he declared, were the storm centers of modern civilization, embracing every civilized and barbaric extreme of culture and ignorance, virtue and vice, and were the breeding grounds of every kind of evil. He argued strongly for the work of the church to fight the inevitable tendency to evil, which was so little checked by any form of civil government.

The superannuation board complained of the ungenerous support of the convention. There was a decrease in receipts available for distribution. The highest annual grant that could be made a superannuated minister was \$160, and for a widow \$150, totally inadequate in these days of high cost of living. The amount available for distribution was only \$3,786 altogether. Five times as much was needed. The fund should be an insurance scheme, such as was the Methodist superannuation fund. It was stated that an attempt had been made by the Canadian Life company to place the fund on an insurance basis, but only three subscriptions were received. Ministers generally were to poor to pay insurance rates, for many of them only received starvation salaries.
