

MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY

(Continued from page seven.)
ed the attention of Presbytery to the death of Mrs John Murray, and moved the following resolution, which was duly seconded and carried. That the Presbytery convey to Mr John Murray and the members of the family its very sincere sympathy in their sorrow and irreparable loss sustained by the death of Mrs Murray, since the last quarterly meeting of Presbytery.

On motion it was agreed that the congregation of Bloomfield be authorized to raise the sum of one thousand dollars on Church property. Mr M. N. McLeod reported that he moderated in a call at Cardigan on Oct 28th last, that the call came out heartily in favor of Mr. J. M. McLeod, New Mills, N. B., that it was signed by one hundred and six communicants and one hundred and fifty adherents and that it was accompanied with a guarantee of eight hundred and fifty dollars stipend with use of manse and glebe. The conduct of the moderator was approved. Commissioners Alex Martin and Neil McCannell testified to the unanimity of the people in this matter. On motion the call was sustained as a regular Gospel call and the clerk was instructed to forward the same to the clerk of the Presbytery of Miramichi. Rev A. F. Carr was appointed to represent the Presbytery of P. E. Island and the congregation of Cardigan before the Presbytery of Miramichi in prosecuting the call.

Provisional arrangements were made for induction of Mr McLeod as follows, on a date to be named by the moderator and clerk:

The moderator of Presbytery to preside and induct, Mr H. W. Toombs to preach, Mr D. Wright to address the minister, and Mr M. N. McLeod the people. Serving of the edict was left in the hands of the interim moderator.

Mr T. C. James reported on the McKenzie Fund. Congregational treasurers are asked to remit contributions to this fund to Mr James as soon as possible. In view of the state of Mr A. D. McKenzie's health Presbytery decided to ask the Foreign Mission committee to urge upon Mr McKenzie to return home for a time for change and rest, and also decided to vote the sum of one hundred and twenty five dollars out of the McKenzie Fund to pay his travelling expenses.

Mr R. G. Strathie was instructed to write Mr McKenzie and express to him the feelings of the Presbytery on this matter. The following resolution was moved by Mr T. P. Fullerton, seconded by Mr Geo E. Ross and carried unanimously.

Whereas certain preachers from abroad have been attacking and denying some of the historic and fundamental tenets of the Christian religion; and, whereas the preachers variously known as Catholics, Unitarians, Go-Preachers; no sect; no church; Jesus way, etc, have gained an entrance into Christian settlements and homes within the bounds of the Presbytery where they have succeeded in creating religious dissension in peaceable communities in breaking up homes, alienating parents and children and in stirring up unseemly strife and discord generally, thereby doing incalculable injury to the cause of true religion; And whereas it has been brought to the notice of this Presbytery that certain affidavits have been sworn to, alleging that the said Go-Preachers, etc, are acting in conjunction with procurers and procurers whose object is to lure young girls from their homes, and whereas the said preachers to our knowledge, denounce all ordained ministers as money-seekers and Mammon worshippers who are deceiving the people and who are doing immeasurable harm to the cause of pure and undivided Christianity.

It is therefore resolved that it is the finding on this Presbytery to warn, and hereby does warn ministers and congregations to be on their guard against all so-called "evangelists," who, under the specious plea of preaching the gospel of Jesus Christ, are undermining the true faith and are doing immeasurable harm to the cause of pure and undivided Christianity.

On motion it was decided to appoint Mr W. H. Spencer to take the usual services in the congregation of Bloomfield, O'Leary and West, Cape on Sabbaths Nov 7th and 14th, the convener of E. M. Committee to provide pulpit supply for Covehead up on these two Sabbaths. (To Be Continued.)

At the Police Court yesterday morning, Daniel Murray was convicted of a second offence against the Prohibition act and fined \$200 and costs of four months in jail. This case has been adjourned from time to time since its first hearing a while ago, this being made necessary by the absence of one of the witnesses named Treavor, who it appears was induced for a stated sum to keep out of the way of the officers of the law when they attempted to serve a subpoena on him. To this end he paid a visit to some of his friends in the country but after some little time spent in locating him he was brought before the court and his offence convicted Murray. This came out at the trial and it is quite probable that the matter of tampering with witnesses who were to testify in this case will be investigated later. One drunk, James Watson, was allowed to go free, this being his first offence.

Montreal reports say the cheese market is on the quiet side after the boom of last week, and the response of buyers yesterday and today has not been very encouraging. The English buyers are again holding off, as they evidently do not feel like operating at the present level of prices. The receipts of New Zealand cheese have evidently affected the demand for the Canadian article to a very large extent, as the former is offered at 55c to 56c delivered at London. The outlook does not look too hopeful for though the local market may improve later on, the stocks on spot are bound to become heavier, and then steampers leave this port, these stocks are bound to become heavier, and then it will be necessary to add an eighth to the price for the additional railroad haul to the winter ports, which will bring even higher prices. The season of 1909, which will soon be over, has been a disappointing one to the traders here and in England. Prices today are 11c to 11 1/2c for easterns and 11 1/2c to 11 3/4c for westerns.

REVENUE AND EXPENSES. OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—The total revenue of the I. C. R. for the last fiscal year was eight million, five hundred and twenty-seven thousand and sixty-nine dollars, and the operating expenses eight million, three hundred and twenty-eight thousand, and twenty-one dollars, leaving a deficit of eight hundred thousand, nine hundred and fifty-seven dollars.

The revenue from passenger traffic was two million, four hundred and eighty-nine thousand, and thirty-four dollars, from freight traffic five million, four hundred and twenty-two thousand, six hundred and twenty-four dollars and from mail and express three hundred and fifty thousand, four hundred and seventy-eight dollars.

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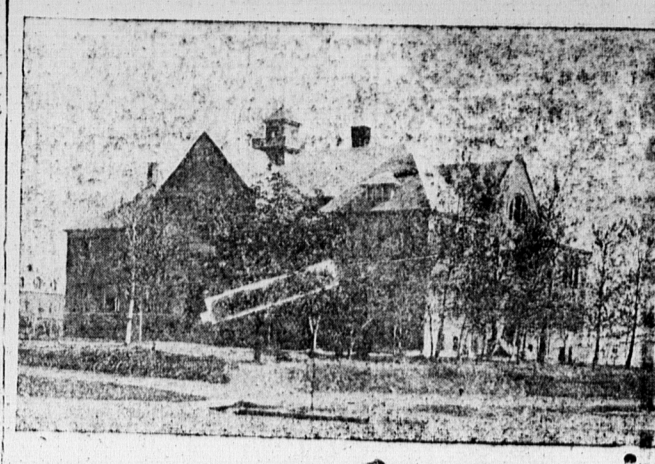
