Gains Made by Labor Party in Great Britain

LONDON, Nov. 4. — Unusual gains were made by the Labor party in the recent municipal elections in England and Wales, especially in the northern industrial districts in England. The labor element now controls Leeds and Sheffield city councils.

Labor gained eight seats in Birmingham, besides gains in several places in Liverpool, five in Bradford, five in Leicester and five in Nottingham, besides gains in several other places, including Swansea, Wales, where four seats have been gained.

Every year for some considerable time the Labor party had made vigorous efforts to secure ascendancy in the local councils and this year the party had nearly 800 candidates in 70 boroughs, compared with 600 last year. In many boroughs the Liberals and Conservatives united under the name of "Citizen Society" candidates and though this considerably eliminated triangular contests it failed to prevent Labor forging ahead in places hitherto deemed Labor-proof.

One-third of the councillors in the various municipalities retire each year, excepting the London County Council, which dissolves as a whole body triennially. There was no contest this year in connection with the London County Council.

No Wage Increase For Railwaymen

OTTAWA, Nov. 4. — Recommending that there be no increase in wages of fifteen thousand employees of the Canadian Pacific and Canadian National Railways, the Board of Conciliation appointed to investigate the wage dispute between these employees and the companies, has filed a majority report with the Minister of Labor. This report is signed by Mr. Justice Hugh T. Kelly, of Toronto, chairman of the board, and by Isaac Pitblado, the representative of the railway companies. A minority report hearing the signature of David Campbell, of Winnipeg, representing the employees, recommends, among other things, that the increase of six per cent, awarded by the United States Labor Board to conductors, trainmen and yardmen two years ago, be adopted in Canada.
