EARL GREY is a good figure of a man. He is tall and dark, and typically English in his manner and speech. He is not a fluent speaker, as he freely admits, but gives the impression of being sincere in all he says. He is very popular in Ottawa, due, he said, to the ability he has shown of grasping the essential features of Canadian life and his plain unassuming manner. The Countess Grey is a woman of pleasing presence. She was gowned in her recent visit to Sydney in a chic pattern of satin covered with black all-over lace. She wore a pretty lavender chiffon hat with white ostrich feather ospreys. She took no part in the exercises, but her every feature showed a lively interest in the proceeding. Her eyes are blue, keen and smiling and, her mouth and chin bespeak splendid character.

THE minutes of the N. B. & P. E. I. Methodist conference held in Charlottetown last month are to hand. The book contains, in addition to an account of the business transacted, several pages of statistics showing the growth of the church and its various affiliated societies during the previous year. The present membership of the church in the two provinces represented by this conference is 13,837 with 288 on probation; a net increase of 114 for the year. This is less than one per cent and would not strike the average layman as a particularly encouraging statement. When the reader turns to the statistics giving the amount of money raised during the year, he is met with a more favorable showing. In almost all the departments there was a larger amount raised than during the previous year. For instance, the increase in ministerial support was over \$900. There was an increase of \$140 in the Temperance fund, \$82 in Educational fund and \$332 in the Missionary fund over the amounts raised for these funds in 1904. The total amount raised for all church purposes last year was \$130,339. It may be interesting to learn that there were 219 Methodist Sunday schools in this conference last year. These schools had a membership of 13,008 with 1,683 officers and teachers; 5,500 of the scholars are pledged total abstinents. These 219 schools seem to have raised for all purposes \$7,587 during the year. Of this amount \$5,987 was for school purposes, the balance being divided between several other funds.
