Sons of Temperance Gleanings From Tryon And Vicinity

HALIFAX, July 21. - "If we expect to retain our prohibitory law, we must take a leaf from the book of the Temperance Alliance of Prince Edward Island," said Mrs. H. P. Newcombe, Worthy Patriarch of the Mayflower Division, Sons of Temperance, who was one of the four speakers at the National Division meeting held at the First Baptist Church last night.

In reviewing the recent election campaign carried on in the Island, Mrs. Newcombe stated that there were three main reasons for the temperance victory. In the first place, the issue was unclouded, un-mixed with matters of political expediency, as was the campaign carried on in Ontario by Premier Ferguson. Again, the Temperance Alliance, led by Rev. A. A. McLeod, were indefatigable in their activity. They went on the platforms themselves, and conducted an intensive and unflinching crusade.

The distress continues the most acute in the history of the Union of South Africa, with relief funds raised in all towns. These, however, are barely adequate to meet the demands of the sufferers.

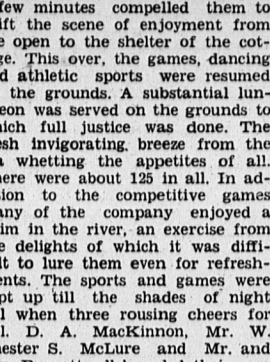

IMMIGRATION POLICY REGARDING LABORERS SOON TO BE ALTERED.

TORONTO, July 23. - Within the near future Canada will radically change her policy in relation to immigration of foreign subjects, it was learned by The Globe yesterday.

The change will not concern farmers or farm workers in general, but only immigrants of the laboring classes, it was stated.

According to information received at the local Ontario Immigration Office, it appears that the Federal Government Commission of Immigration only just recently has concluded a visit here to obtain first-hand information regarding the actual standing of immigration questions in this Province, such as the proportionate demand for and supply of labor.

As the immediate result of the Commission's inspection and investigations here, it was learned, he is reported to have said that "in the very near future the bars would be put up against wholesale immigration of European labor into the Dominion."

The underlying purpose of the measures would appear to be the desire to increase purely British immigration. It is said that a great number of non-British Europeans in Canada - although unemployed at present - have refused to take employment where it had been brought to the attention of the Commissioner that many had given such excuses as "hot weather" for shying at jobs offered them.

PRICELESS JEWELS ARE FOUND IN EGYPT CAIRO, July 23. - According to the Egyptian press, an important discovery has been made in Egypt's Western desert, where tombs have been found containing the mummy of a woman, presumably a Queen, covered with jewels of priceless description, among which are eight-teen bracelets of gold and silver, five necklaces in brilliants on her neck, and a superb crown studded with brilliants.

Near the body were found other necklaces in sapphires and brilliants, also a statuette beautifully carved from porphyry.

Hieroglyphics on the tomb indicate that the body is that of a Princess who lived three thousand years ago, but it has not been possible yet to establish to what dynasty she belonged.

PULLETS HATCH IN APRIL AND NOW BEGIN LAYING OSHAWA, July 23. - Two eggs, only a little smaller than ordinary, were found on Sunday by Thomas Peters, 77 Park Road South, in the coop of his chicken-run, in which is a brood of this year's White Leghorn pullets. They broke their shells late in March and early in April. Mr. Peters thinks this constitutes a laying-record for young pullets or chickens.

The pullets are only three and one-half months old. He found one of the eggs when he entered the coop in the morning, and the other in the afternoon, showing that more than one of the chickens is laying slightly ahead of time.

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BRITISH BUDGET PASSES HOUSE (Special to the Guardian) LONDON, July 23. - The United States will be represented at the inauguration of the International Peace Bridge at Buffalo on August 7th by Vice-President Dawes and Secretary Kellogg.

The Prince of Wales and Premier Baldwin of Great Britain will participate in the ceremonies.
