EMPEROR KWANG SU

Will Agree to the Powers Demand

PAYING AN INDEMNITY

Of \$735,000,000 With Other Hard Conditions as Below.

TIEN TSIN, Dec. 15.—According to credible Chinese sources of information, Emperor Kwang Su will agree to the following 10 demands of the powers:
First—Indemnity to the amount of 700,000,000 taels (about \$735,000,000) payable within 60 years, and guaranteed by the Likin.
Second—The erection in Peking of a suitable monument to the memory of Baron von Kettler.
Third—An imperial prince, a near relative to the emperor, to go to Berlin to apologize and express regrets for the murder.
Fourth—Foreign troops to hold the lines of communication between Taku and Peking.
Fifth—Punishment of the "Boxer" officials.
Sixth—Candidates from districts where anti-foreign outrages have been perpetrated not to be allowed to complete in the Chinese examinations in Peking for five years.
Seventh—Abolition of the Tsung Li Yamen.
Eighth—Foreign envoys to have access to the emperor at all times.
Ninth—Importation of arms and ammunition into the province of Chi Li to be abolished.
Tenth—The land and sea forts between Shan Hai Kwan, Taku and Peking to be destroyed.

WITH THE ESKIMOS

Canadian Explorers Rescue an Englishman Who had His Experience.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Dec. 18.—Prof. J. W. Tyrrell and Prof. J. W. Bell, the celebrated explorer of Canadian wilds, has returned from a 5,000 mile tour to the northwest of Hudson Bay.

In August Prof. Bell rescued an Englishman named Charles Bunn, who had been held in captivity by the Eskimos for five years. Prof. Bell was amazed to see a tall, well built man dressed like an Eskimo come running up and address him in English as he entered a village. Bunn said he had gone out from Edmonton in 1896 and had wandered far into the interior, shooting and trapping. He ran short of provisions and applied to an Eskimo family. They took him to their village, where he was compelled to remain, living as one of them. He had several thousand dollars' worth of furs. He joined Bell's party and came out to Edmonton with them.

ONTARIO'S MINERAL RECORD.

Ontario made the record of a mineral output valued at eight and three-quarter million dollars last year. This gave employment to 10,000 men, who earned close on three million dollars in wages. The value of the output was 21 1-2 per cent, greater than for the previous year.

A PROCLAMATION
By His Honour PETER ADOLPHUS McINTYRE, Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Prince Edward Island, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS, the Legislative Assembly of this Province stands prorogued until Tuesday, the Eighteenth day of December, next.

I have thought fit, by and with the advice and consent of Her Majesty's Executive Council of this Province, to dissolve the said Legislative Assembly, and the same is hereby dissolved accordingly.

And I do hereby give notice to the members for the several Electors' Districts and Towns and Royalities, within the said Province that they are hereby discharged from further attendance in the said Legislative Assembly.

And I do further declare that I have given orders, that Writs calling a Legislative Assembly be issued in due form, the said Writs to bear date the Fourteenth day of November, instant, and to be returnable on Wednesday, the Second day of January, A. D. 1901, of which all persons concerned, are required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Given under my hand and the Great Seal of this Province, at Charlottetown, in the said Province, this Thirteenth day of November, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred, and in the Sixty-fourth year of Her Majesty's Reign.
