THE ICE BOATS.—Yesterday morning at 7.15 the ice boats left Cape Traverse with 7 sacks mail arrived in Tormentine at 10.05. At 6.50 the boats left Cape Tormentine and arrived at Cape Traverse at 10.50 with 60 sacks mail.

THE STEAMERS.—The Minto docked in Georgetown yesterday morning at 10.15 o'clock with 4 tons freight, 7 sacks mail and 14 passengers. The Earl Grey docked in Pictou from Charlottetown at 12.50 taking over 24 tons freight, 26 passengers and 5 sacks mail.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT.—Patent No. 769439 which was granted to Harry McTavish of Belfast, P. E. I. on packing boxes and crates is now being considered by manufacturers in the city of Onaway, Michigan. Those numbers cover valuable claims on exclusive American rights and according to information received by Mr. A. M. Carlsen, who secured patent rights for Mr. McTavish, it is deemed necessary to at once file claims for British patent on this device. The British patent will at once be drawn out and it will afford protection over England, Wales, Scotland, Ireland and Channel Islands. This will be done in order to protect the large cities like Glasgow and London. A drawing and specification of this box will appear in the Royal Gazette in a few days, a weekly paper issued by the Patent Office at Washington, D. C.

CRAPAUD.—The closing debate of the Young Peoples' Mutual Improvement Society, Crapaud took place last Saturday evening in Lady Pan Hall, Crapaud, which was conducted by the junior members of the society and reflected great credit on the youthful members. BUYS FARMS.—Mr. Domithan Lacquere, who has spent the past few years on the Magdalen Islands by his uncle Rev. Father Blaquiere and who came to the island last fall as lately bought a farm in Rustico, owned by Mr. Stanislas Buote. The farm with fine buildings occupies a very convenient place at a reasonable distance from the Catholic Church and also from the school. Mr. Blaquiere intends to go out to the Canadian west before he settles down in his new home.—R.

ISLANDER HONORED.—Presented to Rev. John W. Wadman, D. D., superintendent of the Methodist Mission in Hawaii, as a token of respect and affection by the First Korean M. E. church. The foregoing is the inscription on an artistically designed loving cup presented to Rev. J. W. Wadman by the members of the congregation of the First Korean M. E. church at a reception given in his honor Wednesday evening. The reception was attended by more than 300 persons. The presentation address was delivered by W. K. Allan, other addresses following. In response, Doctor Wadman sketched the history of the Korean church of Honolulu, which was organized in a little building on four wooden posts in Pict Street and which, at the beginning, boasted of but 10 members. Some months later the church was moved to a brick structure on Nuanuan Street. In December, 1905, Bishop John W. Hamilton arrived in Honolulu and, with his assistant, the members of the congregation succeeded in purchasing the present school and church building—known as the Scream compound and valued at \$25,000. The church now has 200 members and the school 120 students. Dr. Szymanski is the principal. This school was organized by Mrs. Wadman in 1906, and she continued as principal until June of last year. Doctor Wadman brought out other interesting incidents in connection with the mission work. Rev. R. Elmer Smith, who succeeded Doctor Wadman as superintendent of the mission for a brief address, and Bishop Naphtali Luccock pronounced benediction. Dr. Wadman resigned the superintendency of the mission last November and assumed his duties as superintendent of the Antislavery League of the Hawaiian Islands January 1, 1914.—Dr. Wadman referred to as a native of Crapaud and was at one time pastor of Grace Methodist Church in this city.

CHURCH BURNED BY SUFFRAGETTES

TORONTO, March 28.—Rev. E. B. Rankin, formerly of Sydney, C. B., is pastor of the White Kirk Presbyterian Church, Scotland, recently burned by the suffragettes.
