FINAL SCENES AT THE HOUNDSTITCH TRIAL

LONDON, May 31.—After lasting nearly a fortnight the sensational Houndstitch trial has been concluded.

It ended with the acquittal at the Old Bailey of the three men charged with conspiracy to break into Mr. Harris's jewellery shop. The woman, Niva Vassilleva, was sentenced to undergo a term of two years' imprisonment. The woman had wept silently in the dock while her counsel in his plea made reference to her pitiful plight after the death of Garstein, her lover.

As if to set in poignant contrast joy and sorrow, Mrs. Rosen, married two days before her husband's arrest, sprang to his side on his release, and kissed him passionately. The three men acquitted are Peters, Duboff, and Rosen.

Mr. Justice Grantham's summing-up to the jury, lasted half-an-hour. His lordship said that of all the trials he had been engaged in he did not remember one that had presented more difficulties. The trial had taken nearly a fortnight. If anyone had benefited by the length of the hearing, it was the prisoners themselves. The accused were all aliens who had to fly from their country for a very good reason. It was equally doubtful whether they were in this country for a very good reason.

There was one man—Police-Constable Martin—who alone could have told the true story of the Houndstitch crime. Great praise was due for the noble way in which the police had acted, but sometimes lavish praise amounted to fulsome flattery. If Martin had shown greater courage and a greater desire to do his duty in this case, he would have acted differently, and there would have been a different result.

The learned judge said he quite agreed that the officer was in great danger but if he had acted rightly he would have been in a position to tell the court how the criminals got away, because they must have carried their wounded accomplice over the officer's body. Yet Martin knew nothing, and he also did not follow the fugitives when they were fleeing from Exchange Buildings.

His lordship added that in view of the attacks made upon the police he saw no evidence for any charge whatever as to the manner in which they had acted under the most difficult circumstances attending any case that had ever been brought before him; they had conducted their case admirably.

The jury were absent for half an hour and returned with the verdict already indicated.

The judge on their recommendation made no order for deportation. The jury were exempted from further service for eight years.

WIFE BEST MANAGER OF HOME, SAYS JUDGE

The domestic side of housekeeping is distinctly not the husband's sphere. He should give his wife what money is needed to run the house, then sit aside and let her run it. Every time he interferes he causes unpleasantness.

This is the advice of Judge C. M. Lee of Rhode Island, who recently refused a woman a divorce on the ground of cruelty, and admitted that her husband slapped her. Judge Lee found that the husband had the right to spank her because the husband caught her rifling his pockets.

Judge Lee says that women are nine times out of ten, better savers than men; that every man who cases a woman can make a dollar go farther than a man can and that woman should hold the purse strings of every household. Here is what Judge Lee had to say recently on domestic problems:

"Forty per cent. of the divorce cases brought into this state are on the ground of non-support."

"Just as soon as the question of finances become embarrassing in a family then trouble is apt to begin. Let the husband find that he must pull up on his expenses and he is likely to get a gloomy view of things, to become irritable. Let a wife learn that she can't have this or that because there isn't money enough really to secure it, and she tends to wish that she had looked ahead farther before she entered upon her matrimonial career."

"Yes; there is a deal of truth in the old saying that 'when poverty comes in at the door, love flies out of the window.'"

"Taking the subject then from that angle, who is the proper person to hold the family purse?" he was asked.

"That depends. My experience, however, has been that women are better savers than men. And they are also better managers when the question is one of household economies. They can make a dollar go farther, for they know how to make every penny count. I am inclined to hold to the opinion that in every so-called stratum of society wives handle the family money more satisfactorily than their husbands."

"In the majority of cases where a man works for a weekly wage, his wife is the better financier. There would be fewer of these non-support cases if workingmen—that is, men who are paid by the week—should turn over their pay envelopes to their wives. Many a man has had his home broken up because he stopped to loiter with his wife's earnings. His habits, his mode of living, his home life, would have been better and happier had he let his wife act as cashier."

"Should he turn his envelope over without opening it?"

"That might be best for some men. When a wife is struggling to get along on the little her husband earns it is only fair in him to give her what he gets. If she is not to be helped, she will know exactly how to require to run
