SENIOR COMMANDER OF WHITE STAR LINE RETIRES

Captain William Finch, O. B. E., the senior commander of the White Star Line Fleet, retires from active duty on his arrival at Liverpool aboard the Baltic which left New York June 28th. Captain Finch, who has spent forty-six years in service on almost every sea, has commanded the Baltic for some years past, and during the dark war-days piloted the big ship many times safely through the submarine zone, landing troops, passengers and valuable cargoes without loss. This splendid record brought the Captain direct recognition from King George, who conferred upon him at Buckingham Palace, the Order of the British Empire. One of the many outstanding incidents of Captain Finch's career was his heroic conduct when the Arabic then under his command, was torpedoed by a German submarine off the Irish coast and sank within eight minutes. In accordance with the best traditions of the sea, Captain Finch went down with his ship, and swam about for forty minutes before boarding a life raft. FREDERICTON, N.B., July 28.—John Tracey, a returned soldier belonging to Harvey, was successfully operated upon for appendicitis at the military hospital last week. The operation was performed by Dr. W. Vernon Coffyn of this city, assisted by Dr. Allan Sterling, and was unique in one respect as the patient was not rendered unconscious. As a matter of fact, he smoked a cigarette while the operation was being performed and coolly watched the surgeons at their work. This was made possible by the fact that he was under the influence of a spinal anaesthetic, administered for the first time in this province in an appendicitis case. He suffered no pain whatever.

The result is a delightful variety. In the afternoon and evening frocks many designers feature the low Spanish-draped sash or girle. When becoming this type of hip drapery is extremely smart, and as a matter of fact it is becoming to the majority of women. The sash may be of fabric matching the dress, or it may contrast in fabric and color or both. The satin frock with sheer chiffon sash is a favorite and the fancy is a charming one. The dress illustrates embodies in its make-up two of next season's popular style touches. There is the low waist line, a very graceful one, and the loose, flying panels. This frock might be made of castor colored tulle or other wool fabric over dark brown satin, the embroidery to be done in wool in shades of brown and tan, or it might be of navy tricotone over black satin, a vivid color touch being given by the use of red head, silk, or wool embroidery. The foundation of this frock buttons up in the centre back, and the over-dress is a slip-over affair, the little opening at the neck making this possible. While not very many bolero or Eton jackets frocks have as yet been displayed, there is a rumor that they will be given very definite attention as the style season advances. The most popular type of jacket is modelled after those worn by Balkan and Greek soldiers. It is cut very straight, usually heavily embroidered, and there is always a wide draped girle marking the drape. With the jacket frocks pleated skirts are, of course, favored.

COULIDGE ACCEPTS FOR VICE-PRESIDENCY

NORTHAMPTON, Mass., July 27.—Governor Talvin Couldidge was formally notified today of his nomination as the Republican candidate for the Vice Presidency. The nomination address was delivered by Governor Edwin P. Morris, of Kentucky and the ceremony was witnessed by a very large crowd. Governor Couldidge in his speech of acceptance reviewed the campaign issues as already announced in the party's platform and Senator Harding's recent speech. Regarding the League of Nations, the Governor said his party favored "the principle of agreement among nations to preserve peace," but pledged itself to maintain "American independence" in making such an agreement.
