

STOLYPIN'S GREAT VICTORY AMAZED POLITICIANS

ST. PETERSBURG, April 6.—The Council of the Empire met in solemn session today and for the first time in its history adopted an interpellation attacking the Government. The discussion devoted to criticism of the vote was 98 to 52, and followed a discussion devoted to criticism of the action of the Government in promulgating the Zemstvo Bill by Imperial prerogative during an artistically created recess of the legislative body.

Last month the Council of the Empire turned down the essential feature of Premier Stolypin's measure establishing the Zemstvo feature in the Government of the Western Provinces. The Premier thereupon decided to make an issue of the right of the Emperor's nominees in the Council to kill a bill which the Emperor had authorized the Ministers to carry, and tendered his resignation.

The Premier's consent to consider his resignation is supposed to have been conditional upon having his way in the new legislation. At any rate the Emperor prorogues both the

Council of the Empire and the Duma for three days and forthwith promulgated the Zemstvo Bill by imperial prerogative by virtue of paragraph 87 of the fundamental laws. Stolypin's victory amazed politicians and thoroughly angered the reactionary element of both chambers.

The galleries were crowded when the discussion of the interpellation opened today. The Ministers were not present. Prince Troubetsky on behalf of the 4 signers declared that the Government had violated the normal course of legislation and the stability of the fundamental laws reposed in solemn Imperial Ukases.

Senator Tatarsky representing the industrial groups of the centre claimed that the broad interpretation of Paragraph 87, which was intended for use on extraordinary occasions, established a precedent endangering the whole structure of the State. Senator Naryshkin, spokesman for the Conservatives, said that the members of his party were not worried over the constitutional guarantees, but the Government's action had shaken the trust of the people in the Emperor's word.

The Government thoughtlessly had led the Emperor into saying a measure bearing a fictitious appearance of legality though it was substantially illegal and without justification of any ground.

Prof. Kovalevsky representing the left wing, declared that the Council of Ministers had usurped legislative functions. Its action meant that a decisive voice in case of disagreement between the upper and lower chamber.

parts of the world. And to us it would be such a boon. In eliminating these three short hauls in our transportation that has robbed us up to date of several millions of dollars; in thwarting our industries and taking the cold cash immediately out of our pockets.

Why should it cost 26 cents a hundred lbs., or equal to 15c. a bushel by the carload, to land potatoes in the Sydneys when I am told they are worth now 80c. per bushel wholesale—because we have no facilities to get them away. We have no rail cars that would ensure the shipper against frost and serious loss. Suppose potatoes were worth a dollar a bushel in Boston today and reciprocity was in full swing. By the time the ice conditions in the Straits favored our shipping, the new potatoes would be in from the South and we would be left again like we were three years ago where we could have realized 50c. per bushel here for every bushel that was to spare but at the last, after failing to get our stock into the market when they asked for it, and found them still on our hands and a could hardly realize 20c. This is a matter of fact which cannot be gainsaid.

The car ferry would eliminate this serious condition of things for the present to say the least, and if the Government could be induced to undertake the work of its construction, how are we going to do for the five or ten years which competent engineers would be required to complete it? With reciprocity almost a certainty when shall we do with our large and increased production? The Steam Navigation Co. who work the ice steamers to "take up" make shift, they do well enough in pot augur days, but now they are out of date in this age of advancement!

We are convinced from actual observation that a powerful car steamer like the Earl Grey could cross at the Capes eleven months of the year and twelve whole months if the conditions are now, as they are. And suppose she made six crossings a day with ten loaded cars, or a total of 60 cars a day, how soon would this Province boom under such improved conditions?

Now, in conclusion, the Capes offers the best of all the routes. It is at or near the three tides meet and recede. No human mind can estimate the force of those tides as they commence to pull the ice apart in opposite directions. Millions, yea tens of millions, of horse power, expended at or a little below Bell's Head every twelve hours, the great head of water in the Strait from East Point to Bell's Head has met the in-rush from West Point, on the north. Here they meet and like two imaginary foes they clasp hands for ten to thirty minutes then each after his own manner wends his way back from whence he came. The ice and other burdens must go his way and in his wake you see the blue stretches of water left in their trail as though a great struggle among the elements had taken place. This is where nature laid it out as the place for the car ferry. Let us be honest with ourselves, agree on this for the present, while we press hard for the tunnel.

THE OUTPUT OF CARS AT NOVA SCOTIA WORKS.

A Big Increase Will be Made Very Soon at Nova Scotia Car Works. Plant When Material and Machinery Now Ordered Come to Hand.

HALIFAX, April 9.—The Nova Scotia Car Works are at work on large orders, one of which is for 1250 box cars from the Canadian Northern Railway. At the present time and for some time past the company has been turning out four cars daily. General Manager F. M. Brown says that heavy stocks of southern pine are due to arrive by the middle of this month, and that then the output will be increased, while with the receipt of new machinery, now being shipped, and which will be installed immediately on its arrival, there will be a still further advance in the output.

Practically all the machinery has been purchased and is now being constructed for the steel underframe department of the Car Works, and it is expected that this branch of the plant will be in operation by the middle of August, turning out steel underframe cars, for which the company has large orders.

The car wheel foundry is turning out about seventy wheels a day, and the number is constantly increasing. The output will be much enlarged when extensions, plans for which are ready, have been completed. 4-11d11.

TRIAL IS AGAIN INTERRUPTED

VITEBRO, Italy, April 7.—Again today the trial of the Camorrist was interrupted when Ciro Vitozzi, the accused priest, weakened by a self-imposed fast, fainted. He was under interrogation and had worked himself into a state of mental and physical exhaustion until he tumbled over against the steel bars of the prisoner's cage. Lawyers and carabinieri rushed to his assistance and in the confusion President Bianchi declared the sitting suspended. At the same time the court ordered Vitozzi to break his fast with the yolks of a half dozen eggs.

The climax came opportunely for Vitozzi following his declaration that he had abstained from food for 48 hours. He had been telling a story of his alleged persecution in prison and the recital was not without dramatic effect.
