

Lecture On Japan

At the Epworth Hall, Summerside, under the auspices of the Young Men's Guild of Trinity United Church, on Friday night last, Rev. Clarence MacKinnon, D. D., principal of Pine Hill Divinity Hall, Halifax, gave a very interesting and instructive illustrated lecture on the traditions and customs of the people of Japan.

In introducing his subject, Dr. MacKinnon gave a very interesting sketch of the origin of the Japanese race, their civilization, religion, customs and home life. The lecturer dealt at some length on the union of the two great religions, Shinto and Buddhism, after years of controversy on the grounds that the worship of the sun-god was merely another form of Buddhism and concluded his history of the religions by telling of the separation of the two creeds in recent years.

Some interesting pictures were shown of the industries and intimate family life in Japan, which contrasted widely with our own manner of living. The famous mountain of Fukuchiyama, said to be the most perfect mountain in the world and the thing which people on leaving Japan watch until out of sight and which artists have for centuries painted, was the closing feature of the address.

A hearty vote of thanks tendered the speaker on behalf of the Young Men's Guild was moved by Mr. Roy Hayes and seconded by Mr. Fenton Crossman.

Rev. Dr. MacKinnon congratulated Miss Mildred Allan on the capable way in which she manipulated the lantern for him.

Rev. Dr. Fraser joined with the audience in expressing their appreciation of the lecture and thanked Dr. MacKinnon on their behalf.

ON OFFICIAL VISIT—Mr. G. H. Vroom of Middleton, Nova Scotia, inspector for the Maritime Provinces under the Fruit and Vegetables Act, left on return home Saturday morning after an official visit to this province where he was looking into the work carried on by the potato inspectors. Mr. Vroom states he found quite a brisk movement in potatoes all over the Island, the market for table stock being firmer and steadier. Potatoes are being very rigidly graded this year into three grades. A. B. C. A number of dealers are putting up what might be known as a still higher grade. Although there are no regulations to that effect and it is known as "fancy stock" the potatoes being 2 1/2 inches in diameter. The object is to get a better hold of the American market which demands a somewhat larger potato than required under grade A. Mr. Vroom says the potatoes so far inspected have wintered well and are in a healthy condition although there is some dry rot caused by mechanical injuries. From what he could gather, he believed that the acreage to be planted on the Island this year will be about two-thirds of last year's acreage. He is quite optimistic, however, regarding next year's prospects.

He announced that instead of the regular Wednesday evening prayer meeting, the Baptist congregation would meet at Zion Church, where Rev. J. S. Bonnell of St. John, N. B., would deliver the Bible Society address.

At the close of the service, Mr. Vincent administered the ordinance of Baptism to four candidates. Mr. Vincent's evening sermon was based on John 3:16 "For God so loved the world.... That is the golden text of the whole Bible. Recognizing the great importance of the words of love at the beginning of the verse—the speaker directed attention to the word PERISH in the same verse. Let not our preaching of Love blind us to the justice of God. God almighty could not be a God of Love, if he were not just in punishing sin.

Church Services

ZION CHURCH
The topic yesterday morning was, "The Unchanging Helpfulness of Jesus Christ." In dealing with this subject the Minister dealt first with two criticisms, i.e. That Christ is obsolete. If He is then all religion is bankrupt. Also that there is a new Christ every few centuries.

The text is illustrated in three ways. Christ is unchanging in His identification with humanity, and with Deity, and also in His appropriateness for present human needs.

"The Person and the Unity of the Deity," was the evening topic. Mr. Fulton delivered what he called a "Class Borne" discourse. Though dealing with a somewhat involved and obscure subject, he seemed to bring it within the range of a large and attentive congregation. His illustrations were vivid and illuminating.

It must be highly encouraging to the minister in particular to see the spacious gallery so well filled with young people. He would say that the singing of the congregation has improved greatly.

A Mass Meeting in connection with the thanksgiving of the Canadian Bible Society will be held in Zion Church Wednesday evening, May 8th. Mother's Day, May 12th., will be observed at the morning service. Special Baptismal service next Sabbath morning.

THE BAPTIST CHURCH
The congregation of the Baptist Church yesterday welcomed the return of Rev. A. J. Vincent, whose period of supply during March was so acceptable. Mr. Vincent will now remain for the month of May, preaching every Sunday. The new minister of the Baptist Church and congregation, Rev. Arthur C. Vincent, D. D., is the brilliant son of Rev. A. J. Vincent.

Good congregations morning and evening were in attendance yesterday. Mr. Vincent's morning sermon, "The Supreme Loss" was a very impressive study drawn from the tragedy of Samson, as told in the book of Judges. The text, Judges 16:30. "And he was not that the Lord had departed from him."

The story of Samson offers us a picture of the successes and failures of all mankind at all times, a picture of the victorious life in God, and the defeated life in our own strength.

In the Old Testament there are four striking characters, who epitomize in their life history the record of Faith. Abel, a justifying faith, through faith he made the perfect sacrifice. His brother, Cain, was an exponent of the New Theology of his time, he offered the sacrifice of the best a man could do, Enoch, who showed the faith of a consecrated life. He had the witness of God's approval in his heart. How many in this church, in this community have it to-day? Noah, the exponent of a faith that separates from the world. He closed the door on what the world wanted, and shut himself in with God. Abraham possessed the faith of obedience. Not knowing whether he went, but well knowing to whom he was going. These four lead us to a life of victory. Samson, gives us a twofold picture, victory and defeat, triumph and frustration.

The Unconscious Loss of Power. "He was not." Living in God he had daily victory, separated from God he knew only humiliating failure. So easily may the spirit be lost, so many of us keep up the form of religion when the spirit is gone, a sort of religious gymnastic. All the organization, all the technical skill of the Church go for naught if the spirit be departed.

Power Lost by Disobedience. He broke his vow. He kept bad company. Live then, in the atmosphere in which the spirit may thrive.

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The speaker went on eloquently and brilliantly to show these two sides of God's character, Love and Justice, as keenly illustrated in the passage—"He that hath the son, hath life, but he that hath not the son... the wrath of God abideth on him." Here is revealed from Heaven, the Love, the wrath, the justice of God. Who shall perish? Who shall suffer God's Wrath?

All those who reject God's "Gift of Love in Jesus Christ, God deals with you now for your treatment of Christ—not for sin. Accept the gift of God in Christ and enter into Salvation, Joy and Safety. The Ordinance of the Lord's Supper was dispensed at the close of the evening service. The music during the day was most impressive, rendered by a specially large choir led splendidly by Miss Spencer. The anthems were "No Shadows Yonder," (Gaul) and Brackets' "We Would See Jesus." Miss Clara Graham's beautiful soprano rendering of "The Ninety and Nine" was heard with deepest appreciation, mingled with regret that this talented artist is leaving our City. Miss Graham's contribution to the music of Baptist Choir and of Charlottetown generally has been a most valuable one.

SERVICES CENTRAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH

The services at the Central Christian Church yesterday were of peculiar interest in that they marked the beginning of the ministry of the new pastor, Rev. W. L. Outhouse, late of Decatur, Alabama. Large congregations attended both services which voiced their appreciation of the splendid messages of the day. The church is fortunate in the selection of Mr. Outhouse as their pastor. He is a fluent and eloquent speaker and holds his hearers with rapt attention.

The subject of his discourses was as follows: Morning, The Christian Church a Family. He went on to show that, as the human family was based on natural affinities so is the church a society based on natural affinities. The evening subject was "The Cities of Refuge." This subject was divided into six main points showing their symbolic relationship to the scheme of redemption.

The music of the day was rendered under the capable direction of Mrs. K. S. Rogers and in addition to the two anthems rendered by the choir the special numbers included solos by Mr. Ben G. Acorn and Miss Barbara MacNeill. Both these singers are well and favorably known as artists of unusual ability and rendered their selections with fine feeling.

The evening service was broadcast by station CFCY through the courtesy of Mr. K. S. Rogers, manager.

"X" SONG SERVICE
The regular Sunday evening song service was held at the Y. M. C. A. last evening with an attendance of 300.

The scripture reading was by Cloyce LePage and Ralph Larkin led the group in prayer. Rev. Dr. Ramsay gave a very inspiring message on christian service, urging youth not to throw away their lives.

Mr. Ed. White was chairman.

TRINITY UNITED CHURCH
The morning service was of an inspiring character, first in the musical programme which included an anthem "The Lost Chord" rendered with fine effect and also a delightful solo "My Redeemer and My Lord" by Miss Clara Graham who is always heard with much acceptance by Trinity's congregation. Dr. Ramsay gave an eloquent and powerful sermon from the text Psalm 119, verse 130: "The subject was "The Bible and The Bible Society" and was treated from different angles. Why do people read the Bible? Why does the Bible Society exist? The Bible is the foundation of our British civilization. How do we know that the Bible is the Word of God? The Protestant Church is dependent on the open Bible and the reading of the Holy Scriptures, herein lies one of the hopes of civilization and lastly the dissemination of the scriptures is the only guarantee of universal peace.

Through a typographical error the attendance in Sunday School for April 28th was given as 50, whereas it should have read 501. The average attendance for the past five Sundays has been 500 against 470 for a similar period last year. Yesterday he attendance was 482.

At the evening service the music was led by a Male Choir of 50 voices. Rev. H. Johnson preached from the words as found in Romans 1-18 "I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God with salvation." The minister dealt with the subject in his usual masterly way pointing out that if Christianity is as we represent it to be, it can and will supply the power to do great things, to overthrow the forces of evil and to act like dynamite in tearing down the strongholds of sin.

The Tuxis Boys have an organization in which Trinity Church takes great pride. There is an enrolment of about 50 between the ages of 12 and 17 and the boys place much emphasis upon regularity in attendance. They are divided into two groups, namely, the Collegiate Square under the leadership of Rev. Dr. Ramsay and the High School Square with Gordon McInnis as leader. The word "Tuxis" has a meaning which is stressed at every meeting. X stands for Christ in the centre, U and I on either side, U before I, then the first letter T is for training and the last letter S, for service. The boys carry out their programme on the four-fold idea, Intellectual, Physical, Devotional and Social. The past year has been one of substantial progress. The boys are able to carry on the work themselves, taking full charge at their meetings, carrying out devotional exercises, leading in prayer, etc. During the recent visit of Dr. Clarence McKinnon here, he met with a number of the boys and was greatly pleased. It is understood that about half a dozen of the boys propose studying for the ministry. During the past season the boys have taken up a course of study of "Work Among Boys" so that as they go forth to other places they will be fully equipped to organize and train up similar groups.

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Supplies and patients could be carried up or down by small captive balloons, he points out.

Physicians have known for years, he points out, that the climate of high mountains is beneficial to many human diseases, such as tuberculosis. But even in countries like Switzerland, where high mountains are available, the summits are rarely high enough to obtain the full benefits of lifting sick people entirely above the cloud layer into sunlight unadulterated by dust or smoke.

In addition, with mountains, it is frequently extremely difficult for a strong and healthy person to reach the summit, and to the sick such a journey is impossible.

Why not urge aircraft engineers, Dr. Opper admits, to devise great metal structures, open on four sides to the air, roofed with ray-transparent glass, and lifted by great gas-bags at the four corners, to provide aerial homes for scores or even hundreds of sick?
