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SOME ASTONISHING REVELATIONS MADE

LONDON, Nov. 7.—Astonishing revelations were made at a meeting of the Dublin Corporation yesterday over which Lord Mayor Nugent presided, when it was alleged that money is being circulated in Ireland by German American agents.

Ald. Kelly denied, on behalf of himself and his friends that they were getting German money.

Lord Mayor Nugent.—"I repeat, Ger-
man money is being circulated."
The Lord Mayor said circulars from America were going through the post containing some of the vilest things ever uttered in the name of Ireland. Some had reached him that morning.

German money had been sent to Ireland, but the gentlemen sending it found that they were not getting good value and were cautious about sending more.

Regarding the war, the Lord Mayor said: "If Britain had not interfered she would have been denounced by the very gentlemen now criticising. Is it because Britain has not been cowardly and has not re-enacted the Treaty of Limerick that we, in Ireland, should pocket all our views and become pro-Germans?"

The Corporation defeated by forty-one votes to seven a proposal to postpone the resolution expressing satisfaction over the passing of the Home Rule bill.

Mr. Devlin hoped to have the Irish parliament on College Green within twelve months.

PARIS, Nov. 7.—A microbe causing gangrene to develop in a bullet and shrapnel wounds has been discovered by Drs. James Scarlett and George Desjardins, of the American Ambulance Service.

Previously initial cultures were impure, leading to the belief of scientists that the disease was caused not by a single germ, but by a combination of germs. After much research and experimentation on horses and guinea pigs, a single bacillus has been discovered and isolated and the serum is now being prepared by Dr. Henri Weinberg, of the Pasteur Institute.

The discovery is expected in medical circles to have worldwide importance. The serum is being injected into patients on the battlefield, obviating amputations and preventing a great loss of life.

FUR COATS BEING MADE FOR THE BRITISH ARMY.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—With the building of new army store houses here it is learned that the government is laying in an immense stock of furs and sheepskins to be made into winter coats for the army. These materials are arriving by the railroads. Already the sheds covers acres of ground surrounded by barbed wire fences and guarded by policemen.

WHITE STAR-DOMINION LINE SAILING SCHEDULE RE-ARRANGED.

The S. S. "Laurentic" and "Canada" have been taken over by the Imperial Government at Liverpool, necessitating an entire re-arrangement of schedule. The "Meganitic" still retains her date from Montreal of November 7th; the "Zeeland" sailing on November 14th.

From Portland and Halifax:—
The S. S. "Arabic" sails December 1st from Portland, and from Halifax December 3rd.
The S. S. "Meganitic" from Portland December 5th, from Halifax December 6th.
The S. S. "Zeeland" from Portland December 12th, Halifax December 13th, thus maintaining practically a weekly passenger service from the beginning of November. The S. S. "Zeeland" and "Vaderland" are not so well known in the Canadian trade as the "Laurentic" and "Meganitic," but have enviable reputations in the New York departures. It will be remembered that the "Zeeland" participated in the movement of the first Canadian Contingent.

On account of the many cancellations, this liberal schedule will be welcome news to intending passengers and shippers. 6141.

\$5,000 FROM COPPER COMPANY OF CANADA

OTTAWA, Nov. 7.—His Royal Highness the Governor General, in his capacity as grand prior in the order of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem, has received a donation of \$5,000 from the Canadian Copper Company, of Copper Cliff, Ont. This sum, transmitted by A. D. Miles, the president, is to be used by the St. John ambulance association in the furtherance of its work in relieving the British and Canadian sick and wounded in France and Belgium. At present the St. John ambulance association has over 6,000 men serving with the royal army and navy, as hospital orderlies and over 500 fully trained nurses in France and Belgium.

NEW SPANISH BRIDGE DROPPED INTO RIVER

MONCTON, N. B., Nov. 7.—While the Dominion Bridge Company was replacing the old bridge with a heavier new steel span on the I. C. R. near Petit Roche, fifty miles east of Campbellton, yesterday afternoon, the new span broke away and fell fifty feet into the river below, carrying a heavy crane with it. I. C. R. brakeman Vetal Bernard, who was on the bridge at the time, went with it. He escaped death, but was quite badly injured. He is expected to recover.

In consequence of the accident traffic was tied up on the I. C. R. at that point, but is expected to be resumed Saturday noon.


U. N. B. WON FOOT-BALL CHAMPIONSHIP

FREDERICTON, N. B., Nov. 7.—By a score of 25 to 3, U. N. B. team won from Acadia at College Field and for the first time in eleven years won the inter-collegiate football championship of the Maritime Provinces.

The Red and Black outplayed Acadia team in every department of the play, with possibly the exception of getting the ball out of the scrimmage, but their superiority was more particularly evident in back division.

With Edgcombe playing a magnificent game as connecting link between the forward line and a fast accurate passing line, U. N. B. scored, or at least was dangerous every time they broke away.
