## LOCAL BRIEFS

Latest News of the City and Province.

REV. F. A. WHITMAN of Bedeque leaves Tuesday 19th to attend the Methodist Conference at Montague.

COURT Mount Stephen, I. O. F., holds its regular monthly meeting to-morrow evening. All members are requested to be present.

THE ladies of the Methodist Church at Souris purpose holding a strawberry festival next month of which particulars will be given in due course.

A TELEPHONE has been placed in the office of Mr. William Calbeck, Bedeque. It is something that the people of Central Bedeque have been urging during the last two years.

THE members of Court Minnewawa I. O. Foresters, Bedeque, are talking of a picnic early in July. The matter will be decided on at the regular meeting on Saturday night 23rd inst.

Mr. Robert Glover the popular clerk with Mr. Colin Wright, Bedeque, has been seriously ill with threatened appendicitis. He is, however, improving under treatment by Dr. Sutherland.

As Rev. Mr. Price is attending the Conference in Moncton, there will be service in the Methodist Church at Souris in the morning and the Presbyterian Church in the evening, on Sabbath next, 24th inst.

THE addition to the Dunk River cheese factory is about completed, which will make the factory one of the largest and best arranged factories in the Province. Two stands for unloading are being built, so two teams can be attended at once. It will be a great improvement, as the waiting in the morning has been in the past a serious drawback. Fifteen thousand pounds of milk was received on Saturday, 18th, which is about four thousand more than the same date last year. Butter is still being manufactured, although the manufacture of cheese will soon commence. With the new boiler and other new machinery, the Company expects to give even greater satisfaction this year than last. Mr. Albert Schurman is President and Mr. William Calbeck is Secretary of the Company.

EASTERN NOTES—Frequent showers and welcome sunshine, two of the elements essential to vegetable growth, are covering the woods and fields of this section with their coat of green.—Lobster fishing is falling all round, the factories are discharging their employees, and it looks as if the end of this valuable industry is not far off.—Cod fishing is fair along the south side where the bulk of the trawls are set, but the school is three or four miles off the shore, very far to go in stormy weather with the dories which the fishermen use here. A good many fish have been taken here with the hook and small line attached used by the trawlers at Cape North, proving conclusively the direction from which they came. Freeman Stewart caught a cod-fish off Red Point a few days ago with the letters F, N, D. cut in his side, probably done at Cape North.—The many friends of William W. Coffin both here and elsewhere who was seriously ill, will be glad to know that he is a little better—the last word from him before the closing of the mail.
