Quackenbush Essays jump To N.H.L. Ranks

Yesterday's scheduled rugby tussle between P.W.O. and St. Dunstan's High School team was postponed due to weather conditions. The game will likely take place on Tuesday afternoon next.

Defense problems of the Stanley Cup champion Toronto Maple Leafs as they approach the 1942-43 season are being worked out by Coach Hap Day's assistant, rest, not in the lap of the gods, but in the rugged frames of Hank Goldup and Bobby Copp.

Although early pre-season exercising of such swabbing youngsters as Red Garrett impressed most of the rabidly cheering season ticket holders with a substantial yell for newcomers, the fact remains that the solution to Coach Hap Day's defense problems for the coming season, will be answered by Goldup and Copp.

Since the Stanley Cup sweep of the Leafs last spring, the Canadian crowd forever has clamored Wally Stanowski, Ben Goldham and Bingo Kumpman, rare birds in major professional puck-bouncing.

Coach Hap Day has gone on record as declaring he would like five defencemen for the season ahead. But last week he was forced to argue. He has seasoned campaigners in Bucko McDonald and Red Hamilton, but he can't be too sure about the rookies to withstand the winter of the ice and the crunches and cane. He has a trick knave still hasn't shouted out loud that it is a rookie to withstand the rigorous National League campaign.

The defensive answers, then, rest with Bobby Copp and Hank Goldup. Copp, former Toronto Maple Leaf star, insists Copp is the best looking defense rookie to come along in years. Bailey should know, for he coached University of Toronto when Copp was one of his defense stars. You may recall that Copp was an outstanding performer when Bailey took the Varsity boys on an international tour, a couple years back, with stops at Spokane, Washington, at Vancouver and at Los Angeles.

Copp, a dental student at University of Toronto, graduates next February. If he makes the Leafs defense line-up he'll have until late time to perform as one of the answers to the Day defense problem. What happens after that no one knows.

Lanky Hank Goldup, a problem child of both amateur and professional hockey coaches, may supply one of the answers to Coach Day's problems.

"Goldup," Day said after a recent drill in the Leaf Camp, "has all the physical requisites for an outstanding defenceman. He has size and speed and puck-carrying ability to become another Stanowski. It depends on the boy himself. He can make it or he can't. He has mind, and I'm confident he will."

Goldup came up through amateur ranks as a left-winger with Toronto last season. He had never played defense before reporting at the current Toronto camp. Coach Day experimented with Goldup as a defenceman in the preliminary stages of the training program. First he shifted him to the forward line; but, with defense problems still unsolved, the Toronto play for Research.

Did Day think Red Garrett a better prospect than Bobby Copp? "I'm not going to answer that question," Day said. "You're watching the practices. You'll have to decide for yourself."

Because of a bad cold, Garrett did not drill with the Toronto and Providence squads Friday. Checking the athletes Thursday and Friday were Manager Clare Hoese and Coach Ace Bailey of the Research Colonels in the new O.H.A. set-up. Research expects to have Jack Shill, former Providence, Boston, Syracuse and Leaf left-winger, in the winter. He belongs to Providence, but hasn't reported for training. The betting here is Shill will remain in his war defense job problems still unsolved, the Toronto and play for Research.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27 (AP)—Mort Cooper, the big apple-checked right-hander of St. Louis Cardinals, snuffed three chances to prove to the American League that he was the pitcher of the year, but he didn't leave any room for doubt in his own circuit and as a result he was named today as the most valuable player of 1942 in the National League.

The 20-year-old Toronto boy who played last season with Brantford of the Junior Ontario Association has signed a professional contract with the Red Wings and will make his debut against Boston Bruins at Detroit Sunday.

As astute judge of youthful prospects as Eddie Goodfellow, now part-time player and assistant coach for the Stanley Cup finalists, Quackenbush has the stuff to make a good in the big time.

Quackenbush was discovered by Carson Cooper, former Detroit player who now does the scouting for manager Jack Adams. Adams sold recently that Quackenbush has the makings of a star. He leaves the 180-pound rookie an outstanding freshman prospect.

If singleness of purpose means anything, Quackenbush is sure fire. He says the only thing that interests him is hockey, although he has played soccer with the Maple Leafs of Toronto's National Soccer League.

FOUNDATION GARMENT CARE
Wash foundation garments as frequently as any other undergarment if you would be fastidious, keep them long-wearing and dainty. Perspiration discolors the fabric, tends to cause elastic inelasticity and stretch and sag. Washing is a good preparation remover. But wash them correctly, carefully. Use lukewarm, soapy water. Dunk the girdle up and down in the suds for several minutes. When all perspiration and soil are removed, transfer the garment without wringing into a clear rinse water of the same temperature. Use as many rinses as is necessary to remove all trace of soap. After the last rinse, press out excess water, but do not wring or twist. Roll in a clean, absorbent towel to blot up additional moisture. Hang over a rod to dry. Ironing is not necessary. Use Minard's for sprains.
