THE manufacture of tobacco needs a great deal of experience. Especially is this true in the selection of the plant. The quality depends greatly on the climate and it is said that while the United States leads in the production of the tobacco plant it is grown more or less in nearly all the temperate and tropical lands. It is indeed interesting to call at Messrs. Hickey & Nicholson's tobacco factory and learn just how the favorite brands of that well known house are put up, especially the care exercised in selecting the raw material. Tobacco leaves in Virginia where the above firm secured an immense stock a few months ago, are sometimes gathered singly; more commonly the stalks are cut, and suspended on sticks under shelter for drying, which requires several weeks. The leaves are then stripped and sorted, tied in bundles and bulked in compact circular heaps to secure fermentation, which develops the properties valued; they are then packed for the manufacturer, who makes them into plug and twist tobacco for smoking and chewing. Historically tobacco was found in use among the Indians at the discovery of America and associated with their solemn transactions. It was introduced into Europe about 1555 by a Spanish physician who brought a small quantity from America into Spain and Portugal. Thence its use spread into France and Italy. Sir Francis Drake introduced it into England in 1585. "Sublime Tobacco" which from East to West Cheers the tar's labour or the Turkman's rest."
