"BOND'S DAY IS DONE."

This was the slogan of the so-called People's Party in the late exciting election in Newfoundland and it proved in large measure successful. Here in Canada at the federal election the name of the Premier also sounded forth in a party battle cry, but with a difference. "Let Laurier finish his work," was shouted by admiring supporters from one end of the Dominion to the other. "Bond's day is done," was bawled by the opponents or enemies of Bond around the shores of the Ancient Colony. There is behind this another verification of the old truth that it is easier well for a man when his friends have his name "much upon their lips, and that it augurs ill for one whose enemies are vociferating his name. Otherwise these specimens of party watchwords are models of their kind, strong, simple, brief, one of five short words the other of four still shorter.

Both Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir Robert Bond are able and reputable men, each perhaps foremost in his home field, but again with a difference. The Canadian Premier is magnetic, a family man, sympathetic and lovable. The Premier of Newfoundland is rather cold in temperament, has magnetic, and a bachelor, we are told. Laurier is in the closer touch with his people, Bond has stood more aloof from the masses. Hence and for divers other reasons, Laurier arouses enthusiasm and devotion, where the cold logic of Bond carries conviction without creating any glow of the heart. Here we give some of the reasons why the name of one of these leaders is most on the lips of his friends and the name of the other made vocal by his enemies.

The St. John's Evening Chronicle, which speaks for Sir Edward Morris and the People's Party, throws a sidelight on the election in a series of telegrams from the outlying districts while the polling was going on. In a score or more of brief despatches hearily all remark upon the way the "illiterate vote" was going. Here are some specimen telegrams:

"Placenta-Polling is brisk here. Great enthusiasm for the People's Party. The illiterate vote is seven to one straight ticket for us."

"Harbor Grace—Things could not look better. The illiterate vote is thirty to one in our favor. Bond's day is done."

"Bay Roberts—Practically unanimous vote polled here. Illiterate vote entirely for People's Party."

"These bulletins at this distance may read like intended sarcasm or irony, but such they are not. They are designed to record the cold facts, and are printed in the People's Party organ. It would appear therefrom that the "illiterate vote" was no unimportant factor in bringing Bond's day to a close.

It may be doubted whether, in the event of present defeat, Sir Robert Bond's day is done. He is yet in the early stages of the middle life of statesmanship, and if he has not fallen may hope to rise again. His popularity, Sir Edward Morris, is still younger, and if he has captured place and power, as seems possible, will enjoy the distinction of being the first

Premier of Roman Catholic faith in Newfoundland in many years. The Ancient Colony has not been very liberal in that regard hitherto, and the present change may mark the beginning of a new and more tolerant era in which the high places of the land are open to all without distinction of race or creed, as they are happily in Canada.

The relations in connection with the purchase of supplies for the Marine Department at Quebec disclosed in the inquiry now being conducted by Judge Cassels, are of a painful character, and show the necessity not only for investigation but for reform and restitution.

By an agreement made two years ago between Great Britain and China it was set that the exportation of opium from India to China should be diminished by 10 per cent yearly, while China is to reduce the growth of the poppy at home in the same ratio. This agreement if carried out would reduce the accursed opium trade in China to a minimum in eight years from the present time. Now a conference has been agreed upon between Great Britain, France, Germany, Holland, the United States, Japan, Canada and China, with a view to international agreement for the restraint of this gigantic evil throughout the world. This conference has been called on the initiative of the United States.

SCARLET FEVER CASES.

Sir—I noticed in your paper some days ago that the Health Officer informed you that there were no new cases of scarlet fever in the city. Now I wish to inform you that a house was placarded two days before he made that statement and there have been five new cases to my knowledge since.

I think it is about time that the Health Officer commenced to perform his duty and have proper quarantine established before we have an epidemic like Chatham N. B.

A placard was torn off one house on Halloween night and has never been replaced, although the attending doctor visits the house almost daily. Also the inmates of two of the infected houses come and go without any restraint whatever, which certainly is not allowed in any other City. The Health Officer should see that infected houses are properly fumigated before the placards are removed. CITIZEN.

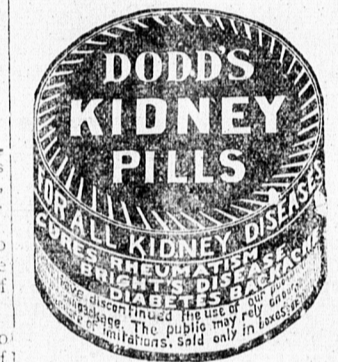
