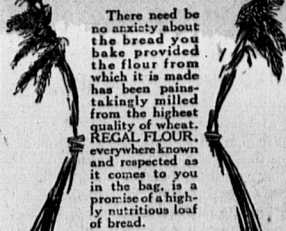
He stopped—looked down at her. "Star-gazing?"
