The committee to arrange for sponsoring a picture reported splendid success in this effort and the manager of the Cameo Theatre was heartily commended for his generous co-operation.

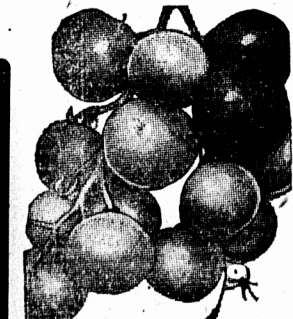
There was some discussion on programs for future meetings. The members were pleased to hear that the pupils of Grades IX and X had accepted their invitation to conduct a debate at the March meeting.

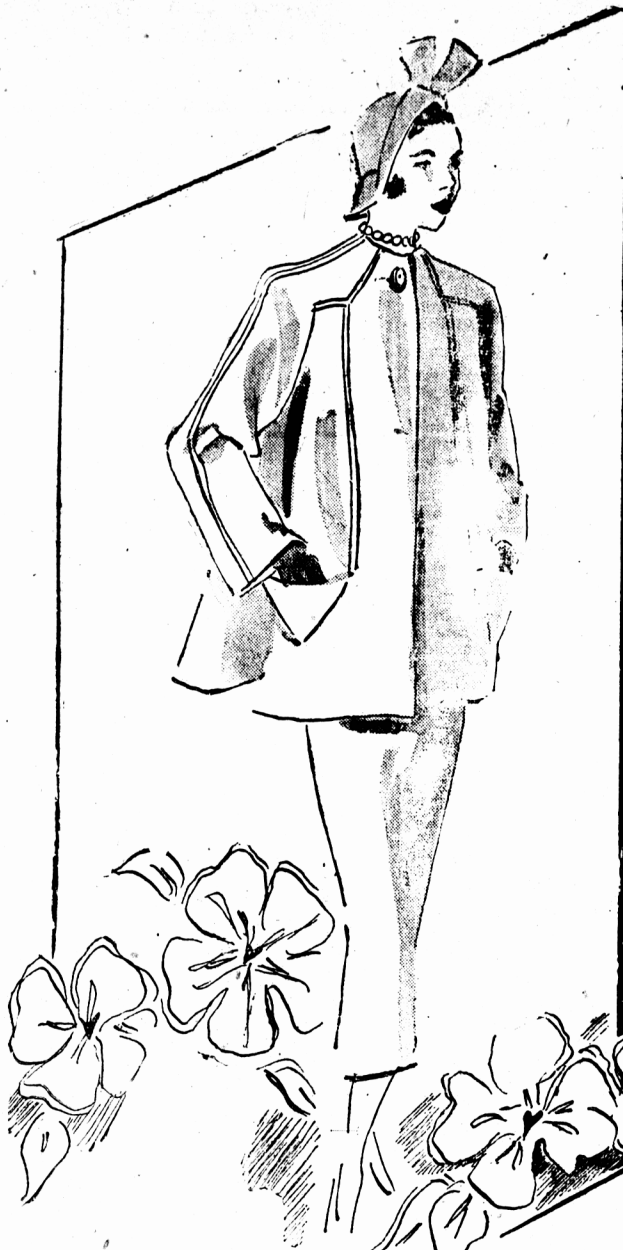
