-FORMER LEADING SUMMERSIDE BUSINESS MAN DIES IN ST. JOHN—One of Summerside's former leading business men, Mr. William Stewart, passed away on Friday evening at the home of his daughter, Mrs. (Dr.) Phillip Nase, of St. John, N. B., at the age of 81 years, after an illness of about four weeks. The late Mr. William Stewart was born at Kelvin and was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Stewart of Kelvin. Early in life he came to Summerside and started his business career in the employ of the late Mr. R. T. Holman. (He was one of the founders of the old firm of Sinclair, Minto and Stewart, which started in business in 1874 on Water Street, Summerside. On the retirement of Mr. Minto in 1885 the firm was continued as Messrs Sinclair and Stewart, and in 1908, on the retirement of Hon.

Nell Sinclair from the firm the business was incorporated as Sinclair and Stewart Ltd., and Mr. Stewart continued as president of the firm until his retirement in 1918. The late Mr. Stewart was known as the Merchant Prince of Summerside, and it was mainly through his keen business acumen and integrity that the firm developed into the great business institution that it is today. In the big fire of 1918, which started on the firm's premises, the building was entirely destroyed, together with almost the whole of the tremendous stock. This was a great shock to Mr. Stewart and he retired from business during that year. In 1918 he sold his beautiful home on Central Street, Summerside, and went with his wife to live with their daughters, Mrs. (Dr.) Nase, in St. John.

Besides his business leadership, Mr. Stewart took a prominent and very active part in the community and social life of Summerside. He was a member of the Summerside School Board for many years, taking a seat on the board in 1899. In November, 1904, he was appointed chairman, retiring in October, 1919. He took an active interest in all school matters, and was largely instrumental in the extension of the school premises, including the Assembly Hall. He was President of the Board of Trustees of the Prince County Hospital for a number of years and took an enormous interest in the welfare of that splendid institution, to which he devoted much time and energy as well as financial assistance. He was a Chartered Member of the Board of Trade, and was one time President. In connection he did a great deal towards improving transportation facilities for the Island generally and especially for the western part of the Province. Amongst his other numerous offices faithfully held he was a Director of the Pioneer Publishing Co., and for a time its President. Since coming to live in the community he was a member of the Summerside Presbyterian Church and was for years the Chairman of the Board of Managers, taking a deep interest in all matters pertaining to the church and giving largely of his time and money towards its support. The late Mr. Stewart was a man of most outstanding character, whose word was always honoured and the sincerity of whose motives was never questioned. His ideals were exalted and his family life blameless. He married Miss Brander, native of Scotland, who predeceased him five years ago. They had two sons and one daughter. Their sons, Leyton and Keith, died a few years ago. To the only daughter, Mrs. (Dr.) Ware left to mourn the Guardian extends sincere sympathy.—S.
