UNITS DELAYED BY "LACK OF BEER"

LONDON, June 15.—The lack of beer in Britain is still holding up the repatriation of Canadian soldiers. It is a leading issue in the Liverpool dock workers' strike, as a result of which all sailings from that port have been held up, and the return of Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta units delayed indefinitely. The Southampton sailings have not yet been interrupted.

The past few weeks have been one of record drought, and unfortunately the supply of beer has been as exiguous as the supply of rain. Millions went thirsty throughout the heat of the Whitsuntide holidays, which seems to have brought the matter to a head. As a result the English public has worked itself up to a pitch of excitement over the lack of beer, which it could scarcely equal with the assistance of an unlimited supply of that mild intoxicant. "If the Government does not take immediate steps to remedy the famine," an English M.P. is quoted as saying, "scarcely a seat would be safe in the event of a general election." There is a general demand for the abolition of all Government control of beer manufacture so that supply and demand may approximate in these days of thirst and honest citizens over foaming glasses can discuss with equanimity the peace treaty and the League of Nations. Until that happy day the public mind will be unsettled and cannot be expected to concern itself, for instance, over the delay of ships while more immediately agitated over the scarcity of schooners.

FORBIDDEN TO PUBLISH MEMOIRS

PARIS, June 17.—(French Wireless)—The German government, according to reports received here, has forbidden the publication of the memoirs of the late Lieut-General Von Moltke, chief of the general staff at the outbreak of the war. It is said that the memoirs contain passages concerning events in 1914, which would produce an unfavorable impression in Germany with regard to the question of war responsibility.

The general, it is said, seriously criticizes the policy of Germany during the period prior to the war. One newspaper here says that a diplomat who read the forbidden book, declared that the publication of the work was stopped for the same reason that caused the German government to postpone the publication of other official documents.

It is said that the Von Moltke book will be published only after the peace treaty is signed.

SOLDIER WELCOMED HOME

A very pleasant evening was spent at the home of Mr. Ed. Cairns, Peakes on Tuesday, June 3, when a number of his friends surprised him with a party in his honor. Gr. Cairns has lately returned from France. He went overseas in 1916 and took part in the principal engagements from that time till the end of the war.

As a proof of their esteem and friendship Gr. Cairn's friends presented him with a purse and read the following address, to which he replied in most fitting terms, and related his experiences in France.

To Gr. E. D. Cairns:—For some time past our anxious hearts have yearned for the coming of this happy event and at last our hopes are realized.

As friends we assemble here this evening to welcome you back to your Home Sweet Home and to recognize the services you rendered your King and Country in our behalf.

We feel that we can proudly call you a hero for in the hour of danger you pledged your life to your Country, in obedience to her call and anxious to aid in securing the peace of the world and in safeguarding our liberties, you were ready to offer the sacrifice of your life on the altar of patriotism. In those years of proud service for us you faced dark bitter hours, but we are assured that the memory of what you and your brave comrades have done, will never fade, but remain an undying example to future generations.

The memory of those who fell beside you, will serve to make us feel more grateful to Him who guided you and whose will it was that you should stand uninjured at the consummation of that awful conflict the greatest in the world's history.

We desire to congratulate the father and mother, the brother and sisters who so willingly and with such a feeling of awful uncertainty let you go from them in the hour of our Country's need.

In conclusion we ask you to accept this small token, not in atonement for any services you rendered but as a proof of our esteem and friendship and we trust it may speak our hearts best wishes for you, those of health and happiness in years to come.
