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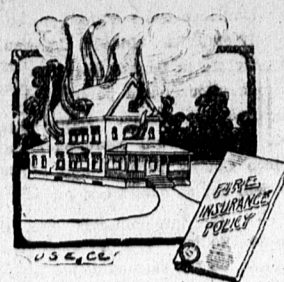

"The Light of Western Stars," which made its initial appearance at the Prince Edward Theatre yesterday, combines the story-telling genius of Zane Grey, the directorial expertise of William K. Howard and the acting ability of Jack Holt, Noah Beery and Billie Dove. Mr. Grey, who knows the West as few other men know it and can write about it sympathetically and understandingly, has turned his attention in this adventurous romance-drama to the vast Southwest, the great range and desert country of Arizona, which for long remained the stamping ground of the cattlemen and bad men of the old West.

The essential flavor and spirit of the story has been captured by the scenarists, George C. Hull and Lucien Hubbard, so that the picture is a convincing portrayal of the picturesque life, habits and customs of those early empire-building days. Jack Holt gives an excellent account of himself as the upstanding, square-shooting cowboy who loves to fight and fight to love! Noah Beery makes the outlaw chief he impersonates just as villainous and despicable as the character calls for. Report Of Wine Industry In Dominion

(Special to the Guardian)
 OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 11.—The Dominion Bureau of Statistics has just issued a report on the wine industry in Canada for 1924. Notwithstanding the decline in the value of products there was a very considerable increase in the quantity of wine manufactured amounting to 290,926 gallons. The province of Ontario produced 87.8 percent of the total value and over 98 percent of the total quantity during 1924. The particular section of Ontario which enjoyed prosperity in the industry was that centred about Niagara Peninsula where on account of favorable climatic conditions the growing of grapes is a well established and successful industry. Imports of wines for consumption in Canada were made from Spain, France and Portugal which in the order named were the leading countries from which non-sparkling wines were imported during 1924, while France alone was responsible for 85 percent of the quantity of sparkling wines imported. In the matter of exports the United States was Canada's best customer taking over 67 percent of the total value of wines exported.

Mother Made Son Aid In Hold-ups

SHOIX Falls, S. D., Dec. 11.—Authorities declared here today that the 17 year old son of Mrs. Catherine Rogers who, with her 19 year old daughter Zora, is charged with robbing the First State Bank at Renner, S. D., confessed to police that his mother forced him to aid her and her daughter in a previous raid on the Renner Bank.

The boy was not placed under arrest. Discovery of two diaries kept by Zora Rogers, and in which, police said were notations of robbery of the bank on October 6, led to the boy's alleged admittance. Although Mrs. Rogers contends that she committed the robbery to obtain money to send her husband, Richard Rogers, a disabled war veteran, to a hospital, police declared Charles Rogers the 17 year old boy, told him his mother's fear of an overdraft in her account at a local bank caused her to turn hand, using him and her daughter as an accomplice.

One of the entries in the diary read, according to police: "Robbed bank at Renner October 6, 1925." "October 6—Chuck and Ma and I went to Renner. Ma got \$190. I got new shoes and Chuck got his radio." Mrs. Rogers' preliminary hearing has been set for Dec. 8.
