The Stanley left Picton yesterday morning but on account of the storm returned back to Picton, consequently there was no foreign mail yesterday.

Prof. Singleton, formerly of St. James' Church, Charlottetown, has been appointed by the Campbellton, N. B., Board of School Trustees to teach music in the several grades at the Grammar School there.

A hockey match has been arranged to take place at the Arena Rink on Thursday evening at ten p. m., between the Barbers and Newspaper hockey teams. It will doubtless be well attended by the numerous friends of seeing a fast, cool, clean, sportsmanlike game will do well to come and see it. Among the shipments by the Minto yesterday were three excellent horses sent by Messrs Essery and McDonald of this City to parties in Edmundston. Two of these were a matched pair of Clydesdales whose combined weight was twenty nine hundred pounds, and are probably the best pair of Island bred Clydes ever sent away. The other was a beautiful driver by Parkwood. This makes thirty horses shipped by this firm since the winter coats began their trips from Georgetown.

The following are the city market prices:—Ducks for one dollar to one twenty-five, chickens per pair seventy-five to one dollar, pork per lb eight and a half to eight and three quarter cents, geese each one dollar to one twenty-five, turkey per lb sixteen to eighteen cents, butter per lb twenty-two to twenty-three cents, eggs per dozen nineteen and twenty cents, hay pressed per ton eight dollars and straw pressed per ton five dollars, hay loose per cwt. forty to forty-five cents and straw loose per cwt. twenty-five to thirty, white oats forty-seven to fifty cents, and black oats forty-eight to fifty-two cents.

He leaves to mourn a mother and one sister, Annie, to whom we offer our heartfelt sympathy.
