**THE PROPOSED TROLLEY CARS.**

The City Council at its meeting of Monday evening heard the promoters of the American Trackless Trolley Company, now seeking corporate powers in order to establish their system in this City and the Council agreed to recommend the granting of a charter to the Company for fifteen years with the use of the streets and exemption from taxation for five years. These are liberal terms, and they express the general desire to have something in the nature of a street-car system established here.

The promoters have evidently produced a favorable impression for their promising enterprise, and we have no doubt that the Legislature as well as the City Council will be quite prepared to afford all reasonable facilities and corporate powers consistent with the well-being of the community. Fifteen years of exclusive privilege is a pretty long term, and it calls for caution in view of the experience of other cities which have sometimes granted concessions of this sort for longer terms than were afterward found to be desirable.

The term of fifteen years may be conceded provided the public interest is guarded in other ways. Certain stipulations on the part of the Legislature will naturally suggest themselves, among them the following: (1) Power for the City to take over the system at any time at a fair valuation with a view to its being operated by the City. (2) A maximum rate for the carriage of passengers and a reduced rate during certain hours of the day. (3) Provision that the system shall be established and put in operation without delay, and kept in continuous operation during certain months of the year.

The Guardian will be very glad to have the Trackless Trolley system introduced here. We believe it to be well adapted to our local circumstances, and that when introduced it will prove to be a great public convenience and prove a forward step in the progress of our city. We shall be glad to see the Company obtain an abundant reward for their capital and enterprise, and are only desirous in the Act of incorporation and the contract to be entered into that the public interest shall be sufficiently guarded.

**THE TELEPHONE CONTRACT.**

It will be seen in our Summerside news that the Board of Trade of that Town have passed a series of resolves in relation to the proposed extension of the P. E. Island Telephone Company's monopoly. These resolutions aim first at a refusal to extend the monopoly clause of the Company's charter, which at present imposes some hardship upon individuals desiring, for instance, to make connection by phone between a residence and a factory, store, mill or office at a little distance away.

We do not apprehend that any one now proposes to set up an opposition telephone system in our city or in Summerside or the Province generally. Some day we may want the Government, or the municipalities to take up this service by acquiring the existing system. Nothing in the terms of the extension should bar the way to such a change. We think an extension for five years is ample. The telephone service everywhere is being improved and great changes are brought about in five years. At the end of that period, if found desirable, the charter could be further extended by the Legislature.

The right to connect residences and places of business by private line, ought to be reserved to the public, under proper safeguards as to any possible interference with or damage to the existing system, or to communication thereby. These safeguards are important, and not perhaps very easy of adjustment. As to the conditions proposed by the Summerside Board with regard to the subsidy to the Company, we are of opinion that any and every corporation receiving Government support should report its financial affairs annually and fully to the Government. When we know what the income and expenditure of the Company is the Legislature will be prepared to decide upon its claims to subsidy and of what amount, and whether or not the rates of rental should be made lower.

Greater secrecy in working the system seems imperative. It has been a constant source of complaint that where so many telephone offices are located in country stores the privacy necessary in transactions of buying and selling is not maintained and commercial rivals frequently learn of what their competitors are doing and what prices they are paying. There are many points to be guarded and our legislators will do well to proceed with care and along safe lines in dealing with the entire subject.

**THE NEW ONTARIO LIQUOR LICENSE LAW**

reflects the conditions existing before the last provincial election. The temperance people were dissatisfied because the Ross Government would not give them prohibition. The liquor interest threw its support pretty solidly with the Conservative Opposition. The Opposition won in the contest, and the result is a high license measure. In Toronto the maximum license fee is to be \$1,200, a sum very much larger than has ever before been charged in Ontario. The liquor interest has long supported high license in countries where prohibition sentiment is strong, as it is in Ontario. On the other hand the recent legislation at Toronto is retrogressive in that it requires a three-fourths vote for the adoption of a local option by-law to withhold licenses.

**A NOVEL IDEA.**

**Grand Trunk's Unique Device for Advertising Canada.**

A travelling exhibition illustrating the charms of Canada as a holiday, hunting, fishing and camping resort, is to be put into operation by the Grand Trunk Railway System.

It will consist of a coach fitted up inside as an art gallery with bromide enlargements made from direct negatives of delightful scenes in "The Highlands of Ontario," including choice bits from the Algonquin National Park of Ontario, Georgian Bay, the Muskoka Lakes, Lake of Bays, Maganetawan River, Lake Nipissing and the French River, the famous Temagami Region, Kawartha Lakes, Rideau Lakes, and the principal Cities of Eastern Canada. The car will also contain mounted fish from Canadian waters, mounted game heads, stuffed birds, moving pictures, etc., making a unique collection of attractive features that will appeal to the tourist and sportsman. A representative familiar with all the various districts will be in charge of the car, and will have a plentiful supply of descriptive matter, maps, etc.

The car will start at Mobile, Alabama, about March 19, and will go through the States of Mississippi, Alabama, Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, and New York. Towards the end of June, or in July, the car will reach Canada, and some of the principal towns and cities in the Dominion will be visited. The tour in the United States will occupy about three months, and in that time seventy-two towns will be visited.

A despatch emanating from Montreal is going the rounds of the press to the effect that after the completion of the Insurance Commission's work a similar commission will be appointed to investigate the banks. This impression appears to grow out of the fact that the official inspection of the banks is made by the Finance Department, which has not managed the inspection of insurance in a manner at all satisfactory.

The Toronto News whose proprietor is a prominent insurance director has been sometimes charged with unduly favoring the companies. But The News speaks out very plainly in regard to the inefficiency of the inspection carried out by the Superintendent of Insurance. Among other things it says:

It is hard to believe that the Minister of Finance was familiar with the perfunctory character of the inspection carried on by his subordinate, the Superintendent of Insurance. If he was familiar with the matter, he should have been, and his failure seems no less grave.

**LONDON GETS NEWS BY UNDERGROUND**

LONDON, March 28.—The 500 mile underground pipe line between London and Glasgow, in which will be laid 40,000 miles of telegraph wires, is practically completed. The post office department has been working on the system for ten years and hopes to have it ready for use in a few weeks.

The object of this underground cable has been to insure the steadiness of the telegraph system between London and Scotland, which has been frequently interrupted by storms.
