FUNERAL TO-MORROW.—The funeral of the late Bessie McKay takes place from her father's residence, Stanley Bridge, on Thursday at 2 o'clock.

BEEF CATTLE SCARC.—Good beef cattle are getting very scarce in this Province. At the Provincial Exhibition held in Charlottetown this year there was a lot of enquiry for good beef bulls and some changed hands at big prices. Notwithstanding that well fitted fat cattle will bring about 70 per cent weight in the market, the number offering for sale is falling off. To stimulate the production of beef cattle a committee was appointed last spring to draft a constitution for a Beef Breeders' Association and to make preparations to complete the organization. Accordingly a meeting will be held in the Agricultural Hall on Friday, October 10th, beginning at 2.00 p. m. to which all interested are invited to attend.

SURELY THE BEST.—It is now quite certain that the greatest number of people that ever came to Charlottetown to attend an Exhibition were in attendance this year. Besides about 9000 persons who came in by the P. E. I. R. and two hundred by the S. S. Lady Sybil from Pictou, the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Company's steamers carried the greatest number in their history. Seven hundred and three passengers came to Charlottetown from Pictou, by the S. S. Northumberland during the four days of Exhibition. The Empress had a passenger list for the four days of the big show, of three hundred and eight. This is the largest number that these steamers ever carried in such a space of time, and exceeds the number of last year by three hundred.

NEARLY SERIOUS.—A fire which might easily have proved more serious than it did occurred a few days ago in the Cox Hotel, Souris. One of the maids had started a fire in a three-lamp oil-stove about 4 o'clock in the morning to prepare breakfast for some guests who were leaving by the early train. While she was temporarily absent from the kitchen the oil tank exploded scattering the blazing oil over the floor, furniture and a nearby table on which there was a large quantity of linen. The fire spread quickly, the household being aroused and after some strenuous fighting in which robes de nuit constituted the firemen's uniforms, the blaze was extinguished but not before furniture, linen, window, etc., were damaged to the extent of some five or six hundred dollars worth. The maid who was in attendance in the kitchen at the time had her hands burned somewhat painfully and her hair and eyebrows singed.

WEDDING AT HOPEVILLE.—The home of Mrs C. B. Leslie, Hopeville, N. S., was the scene of a very happy event, when her daughter, Annie May was united in marriage to James Wylie, of Sydney. To the strains of "Lohengrin" the bride, who was attractively gowned in white silk crepe de chene with trimmings of Maltese lace and Rhinestones, and carried an empire bouquet of white roses and maiden hair ferns, descending the stairway on the arm of her twin brother Everett N. Leslie, preceded by her bridesmaid, Miss Lena Scott, niece of the bride, and a little Miss Gladys and Master Leslie Scott, who unfolded white satin ribbons as they marched, thus forming a pathway for the bride to the altar. The beautiful ring service of the Presbyterian church was very impressively used by Rev. Geo. Logan, the officiating clergyman. Amid showers of confetti, good wishes, and roses, the bridal pair left on the evening express for a short trip to Charlottetown, P. E. I. On their return they will reside in New Glasgow, where Mr. Wylie has accepted a position with the Eastern Car company. Going away the bride wore a navy blue tailored suit with white brocade blouse and hat to match.
