THE WAR GOES ON

Victory has within the past three months glorious by crowned the heroic efforts of the Allied armies on the western front, in the Balkans and in Palestine, but the war goes on.

We may well with devout thankfulness recount our gains, the enemy almost driven out of France and retreating hastily in Belgium.

If we face the facts, however, we must admit that our arch-enemy Germany is still exceedingly strong and formidable in military power.

soil of Germany is almost untouched by invasion, she has four million of armed men on the fighting line and a very formidable battle-fleet hiding in her fortified ports.

Germany is beaten, hopelessly beaten in the war, as all the Allied and neutral nations believe, and the war lords of Germany and many of the German people believe, but she can fight on and probably will do so unless a revolution takes place in Berlin.

Germany is still exceedingly strong and formidable in military power if she can maintain in the coming months that solidarity which has characterized the nation during the first four years of the war.

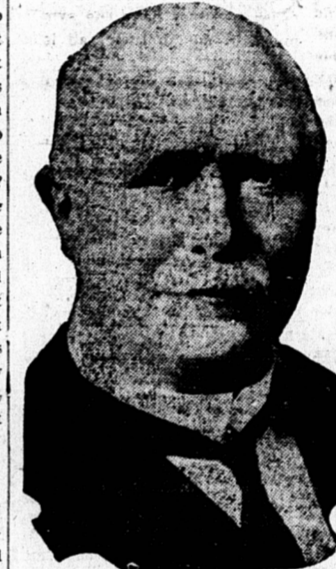

William Ferguson Massey Gives New Zealand's Views Regarding German Colonies

HEAR now New Zealand on the question of German colonial possession. William Ferguson Massey, who for the last seven years has been Prime Minister of New Zealand and Minister of Lands and Labor since 1912.

"The fate of the German colonies after the war, especially those in the Pacific Ocean, is a problem in which Australia and New Zealand are vitally interested. They have constituted a burning question for us during the last half century. It was about fifty years ago that the natives of the islands in the Southern Pacific became uneasy at the possibility of domination by Germany, and they appealed to the British Government to annex them or establish a protectorate over them.

The death occurred in this city yesterday of Mr. Frank Murnaghan, aged 41, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Murnaghan of this city. He had been in delicate health for three years. To his bereaved parents and brothers and sisters the sympathy of their friends is extended.
