VARIOUS SUMMER RECIPES.

Here are some miscellaneous recipes, which will be found excellent.

Prune Jelly.—One-half cup of prunes stewed with one-half cup of sugar; add the juice of a lemon and two table-spoonfuls of sherry and a pinch of salt. Have ready one-third of a box of gelatine that has been dissolved in cold water and 12 walnut meats. Remove the stones from the prunes, and set aside. Then add two cupfuls of the prune liquid to the gelatine and pour in a mold, and when partly set add the prunes and nuts.

Cream Cheese Balls.—These are very good served with salad at a luncheon or dinner, the dish being a very pretty one when the balls are placed in a ring around a mold of jelly, bar-le-duc currant jelly being especially recommended. To make the balls mold cream cheese with the fingers to the size of a butter ball, and press the half of a salted English walnut on each side.
