I., has sent the Guardian an illustrated clipping from the Angeles Evening Herald referring to a fishing trip undertaken by President Coolidge. It reads as follows: "President Coolidge likes fishing for safe and sane trout in South Dakota, but folks do say he'd try for Montana's fur-bearing, exploding trout. Here is the trout with fur skin to ward off cold, which James H. Hicken, railroad man, claims to have discovered in Iceberg Lake, near Whitefish, Mont. The lake is so frigid it breaks ordinary fishhooks, says Hicken, so he heats his hooks and when they touch the water they become tempered. When the fish are taken out, the temperature change causes them to explode, shed their fur overcoats and thoughtfully leave their meat ready for the consumer. Being no ordinary poor fish, fur-bearing trout spurn ordinary bait and bite only on the rare and racy 'beazel' caught on Prince Edward Island. Though Senators Reed and Borah are not on record as favoring the 'beazel', they declare worms are no good for bait—and worms are exactly what President Coolidge uses in his vacation fishing."

MONTREAL, July 4.—Dominion Live stock—Cattle receipts 806. Trading was steady at prices even with or slightly higher than those paid a week ago. One lot of heavy fed steers was sold for \$9.00 good grass steers sold up to \$8.85 and common light grass steers as low as \$5.50. Good heifers weighed separately brought \$8.00 and fair to medium heifers from \$6.50 to \$7.50 according to weight.

Good cows picked out were from \$6.50 to \$6.75 with a few tops at \$7.00. The bulk of the better cows were sold in mixed lots around \$6.00 to \$6.25. Bulls were from \$4.00 to \$5.50 with the bulk between \$4.50 and \$5.25.

Quotations.—Butcher steers choice \$9.00, good \$8.25 to \$8.65, medium \$7.75 to \$8.25, commons \$5.50 to \$7.25, butcher heifers good \$8.00, medium \$6.75 to \$7.50, common \$4.25 to \$6.00, butcher cows good \$6.50 to \$6.75, medium \$4.00 to \$6.00, canners \$2.50 to \$2.75, cutters \$3.00 to \$3.50, butchers bulls common \$4.00 to \$5.25. Bond Street Pastor Begins Legal Action Alleging Slander

TORONTO, July 4.—Rev. W. A. McIlroy, minister of Bond Street United Church, stated to The Globe last night that he had entered action against Rev. W. B. Caswell, pastor of Eglington United Church, on ground of alleged slander. This action, he stated, came as a result of words between the two ministers following a closed meeting of the Central Presbytery of the United Church, which met yesterday to make a decision on moving the congregation of Bond Street Church to North Toronto.

"You are a pig and a dog," Rev. Mr. Caswell is alleged by the complainant to have said to Rev. Mr. McIlroy, Mr. Caswell, it is said, entered the room where Mr. McIlroy and Fred G. Roberts Secretary of the Church Building Committee, were seated, Mr. McIlroy not being permitted to attend the meeting of the Presbytery. In answer to Mr. McIlroy's query, "How are you getting along?" Mr. Caswell replied, "Not at all, not at all."

"You are not a gentleman or a Christian, or you would not talk to me in such a manner," was the alleged rejoinder. "I'll stay it again," Mr. Caswell is reported as replying. "You are a pig and a dog. And if you come up to North Toronto to get any piece of land to put a church there we will do all we can to put you out of business."

The three United Churches in the district, which are particularly interested in the proposed moving of Bond Street United Church to North Toronto, are: St. George's, minister, Rev. W. G. Back; Eglington, Rev. W. B. Caswell and Glebe Church, Rev. J. Robb. Presbytery referred the question of allowing Bond Street congregation to move to the northwest part of the city to the Presbytery's Committee on Church Extension, to be reported on at the September meeting.

Hearst, Mills & Hearst have retained as lawyers in connection with the action which Mr. McIlroy announces he has taken against Mr. Caswell.

Rev. Mr. Caswell could not be reached by telephone last night.

Gleanings From Confederation Dinner In Ottawa

(Canadian Press.)

OTTAWA, July 4.—Premier W. L. Mackenzie King, at the dinner given by the Government Saturday night in honor of Hon. William Phillips, first American Minister to Ottawa, drew pictures of a day when Canada would have ministers at capitals other than Washington, when countries other than the United States would have ministers at Ottawa. He had briefly sketched the coming of Confederation and the development since in Canada's nationhood. It was hoped to believe, he said, welcoming Mr. Phillips, that other nations would not some day also be represented in our capital. And, as other ministers came to Ottawa so would Canadian ministers go to take their part in the diplomatic affairs of other countries. Mr. King did not think that such a development would lead to less but rather to more co-operation within the British Empire. "Those who are puzzled how Canada could follow such a course and still remain within the Empire. "But," Mr. King added, "whatever there may be in the way of increased representation of Canada in other countries simply means increased co-operation within the British Empire."

The tragic death of Lieutenant Johnson, one of the airmen accompanying Colonel Lindbergh to Ottawa, brought sympathetic reference. Colonel Lindbergh was seated at the head table with Mrs. Phillips on his right. Premier King humorously spoke of him as "Mr. Phillips' minister without portfolio," and the other "Ambassador at large." "It would be impossible to express in words the feeling of the people of Canada over the tragedy," Mr. King added, referring to Lieut. Johnson. "I can only hope that both the Minister and Colonel Lindbergh will assure the President and the people of the United States that the whole heart of Canada is with them in deepest sympathy."

Hon. G. P. Graham, chairman on behalf of the National Jubilee Committee, presented Colonel Lindbergh with a gold Jubilee medal. Colonel Lindbergh, replying, observed that the invitation of Canada was the first he accepted since leaving France. He was to leave Ottawa Monday but looked to seeing more of Canada in the near future.

Mr. Phillips read a message from President Coolidge expressing, in the name of the Government and people of the United States "the feelings of friendship and goodwill that animated them towards the government and people of Canada. Americans rejoiced with Canadians in this celebration of historic importance and in all that indicates the happiness and prosperity of this Dominion within the British Empire. As good neighbors they stand ever ready to co-operate with the people of Canada in all that leads toward peace and progress."
