Silent Mac Paces Quarter In 29 Seconds On Saturday In Big Ice Race Meeting

Featured by the fastest quarter mile trotted or paced since the season started, Silent Mac, winning the first heat of the Free-for-all race in 29 seconds from Singing Sam, the ice races held on the speedway off Victoria Park Saturday afternoon again furnished another large crowd of fans with thrilling finishes and fast times.

Delays which kept the six class card from finishing until late in the afternoon was the only regrettable feature of the meet, but the brand of racing witnessed more than made up for the cold the fans had to brave.

Winners on Saturday were Wait N' See, Silent Mac, Lady Hal, Juanita Axworthy, Jippy K. and Princess Kalmuck, four of them being horses owned outside the city.

The cell race was the first race called and it developed into a battle between Wait N' See shifted to the pace and Lusty's First, C. H. Chandler's good trotter.

Wait N' See had things pretty much his own way as he captured the first heat from Happy K., but in the next two Lusty's First, given on real good drivers by Frank Wheatley, came within inches of copying the verdict.

In the second heat particularly Lusty's First was coming very fast and was just inches behind Wait N' See 10 yards from the wire only to jump it off and lose his chance. In the third heat Wait N' See was the winner by a length.

The fans saw a sensational duel in the first heat of the free-for-all race as Silent Mac, Singing Sam, Raymond Budlong and Little Peter went up to take the word.

After getting the word the four hit the eighth mark all in a line but in the last half of the quarter Silent Mac plying went fast as a head in front of Singing Sam at the wire with the quarter in 29 seconds. Raymond Budlong was just inches behind in third place with Little Peter fourth.

Canadiens win 14 Trophy Matches Played At Local Curling Rink In Regular Week-end 'spiel

Canadiens, who in most of their games at home this season got off to an early start only to fade out in the stretch drive, reversed the procedure here last night against Detroit Red Wings to pull off a 3-1 National Hockey League victory before a crowd of 6,339.

After trailing from early in the second period, the Canadiens came through with three lalles in the closing session to turn aside the Wings. The victory placed the winners within three points of Detroit and Brooklyn Americans, co-holders of sixth place in the standing.

The veteran Charlie Sands broke up the game midway through the third period after both sides had turned in a display of glorified shinny.

Cliff Goupille handed Sands the puck for the clincher near the Detroit blue line and the latter swept around two defencemen to neatly beat goalie Johnny Mowers.

A five-minute banishment to Sid Abel for drawing blood from Gouppille forehead enabled Canadiens to add further assurance to their win when Gerry Heffernan tallied while Abel was off.

Little Peter Morin set the stage for the goal after breaking loose from the Canadian end and Mowers deflected his shot on to the stick of the unprotected Heffernan.

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The act as it stands provides that profits of average business during the four years prior to the start of the war be taken as the standard for profits except in exceptional cases, such as new businesses.

The minister said the present provision was considered unfair as some new businesses might have untidy large profits in their first year of operation.

On behalf of Revenue Minister Gibson, Mr. Isley also announced that the commissioner of income tax, C. Fraser Elliott, has clarified the position of sole proprietorships and partnerships under the minimum \$5,000 clause in the act. The tax does not apply unless profits exceed \$5,000.

This minimum, he said, will be interpreted to apply after and not before deduction of reasonable salaries for the proprietors.

ATLANTIC FERRY PILOT VISITS OLD HOME TOWN

MONTEAL, Que., Feb. 8—Two Trans-Canada Air Lines' pilots, Captains George Lothian and Malcolm Barclay, have resumed airline service after a three-month leave of absence during which they ferried bombers across the Atlantic for the Ferry Command. For Barclay it provided an opportunity to visit his home town, Greenock, Scotland, and swap notes with his brother, Captain David Barclay of Scottish Airways, who has distinguished himself making "metric flights" to remote parts of Scotland. Since leaving Scotland 12 years ago Malcolm has done the same thing in Canada as a "bush pilot" before joining T.C.A. Both men learned their flying at Renfrew. TORONTO, Feb. 8—(CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs, who are expected to furnish most of the opposition in the New York Rangers in the playoffs, gave the National Hockey League leaders a slight sample Saturday night of what they could expect.

Before a sell-out crowd of 13,539 customers, the revitalized Leafs outscored the lightest-scoring club in the league 6-4, but even on the hand-to-hand exchanges that featured the latter part of an exciting contest.

Although the Leafs beat the New York smoothes, they didn't exactly spike the Rangers' big gun—Lynn Patrick. The big left winger, who leads the league's goal-scoring, rapped three lalles in the eventual third period to consolidate his hold on the goal-getting honors.
