BISHOP'S PALACE.—Arrangements have been made with the John Metcalfe Company, Montreal, to erect the mason work and put on the roof of the new annex to the Bishop's Palace, Charlottetown. Mr. Alfred Chalmers, Charlottetown, has the contract for cutting the stone and has had a good staff of workmen engaged during the winter with the result that the work is almost completed.

THE STEAMERS.—Yesterday the Earl Grey, on her way to Charlottetown, with 75 bags of mail, 30 passengers and 152 tons freight on

PASTOR'S PLEA TO HIS PEOPLE.—In his sermon at Jubilee Methodist church, Sydney, on Sunday night Mr. McConnell, formerly of Charlottetown, preached from the text 1 Cor. 1:18. In opening he referred to the place of the Cross in all the preaching of the Great Apostle. In Athens, Ephesus, Carruth, Rome, notwithstanding all their idolatry and wickedness—he preached the Cross of Jesus. Individuals, Churches, nations, perish or are being saved according to their attitude to the Cross. There is no lifting power in the world like the power of Christ's Cross. All that is best in our civilization is traceable to the Cross. But what are all our great advantages

on national lines compared with the spiritual blessings that flow from the Cross. We live because Jesus Christ died. Here at his Cross is forgiveness and peace and heaven. People in every clime and of every tongue are feeling this. He makes new conditions and new men by the mighty power of His Cross. We do not appreciate as we should all that is ours because of His death. Many men today are willing to take all the outward benefits of our civilization and reject the Cross from which those blessings come. What is the sweep of its magnetic power. In closing his sermon Mr. McConnell appealed to the congregation to come to accept the Saviour

as their Saviour, to live through his life and to find redemption through His blood.

Laird, M.P. and Mr. George Smith who entered into the higher service of their Lord on Feb. 1912 and May 1912 respectively. The death of Mr. Leander Smith in Dec. 1912, left the Division without a leader, and during the past winter the few remaining members have discontinued the work. While all regret the present situation, they are proud of the accomplishments of these noble soldiers and their collaborators who have transformed this community into one unsurpassed in temperance sentiment.


