WEDNESDAY

POWNAVAL SCHOOL.—The annual meeting of the Pownal school district was held on Tuesday, 5th. More than the usual number of rate-payers were present. Capt. W. E. Smith was the retiring trustee and was unanimously re-elected. \$50 was voted as supplement, total for expenditure \$125. Mr. A. A. Moore was reappointed secretary, and Mr. Lock Jones, J.P., re-elected auditor.

HOME GUARD.—At a well attended meeting of the Charlottetown Home Guards held last evening at the Aarouries, it was unanimously decided to continue drilling during the summer, either once or twice a week as the officers deemed advisable. Members of Nos. 1 and 2 Companies will turn out next Tuesday night and drill together. The weekly drill of No. 1 Company on Thursday night is therefore cancelled. All members of the Home Guard will meet Tuesday night for rifle drill at 8 o'clock at the drill hall. The meeting was enthusiastic and every man present expressed a desire to continue the organization. A hearty vote of thanks was passed and three cheers given to the officers who had been so faithful in their military services, after which the meeting closed by singing the National Anthem.

SUDDEN DEATH.—This week Mr. Thos. DesRoches, of Bedouque was found by his brother, with whom he lived, dead in bed. An inquest was held on the body on Thursday by the coroner, Doctor Jardine, and the jury, of which Mr. John Davison was the foreman, returned a verdict to the effect that the deceased, who was thirty-eight years of age and unmarried, came to his end from natural causes, death being due to acute dilatation of the stomach, with congestion of the lungs and kidneys. On Thursday morning the deceased called at Mr. Richard Arsenault's and after opening the door fell to the floor. Mrs. Arsenault did what she could for him and when her husband came home about one o'clock he advised the home to go to his brother's, about half a mile away. This the deceased started to do, but was found later by the side of the road by Mr. Crossman, who drove him to his destination. There, complaining of pains in his stomach, he went to bed at about 2.30 p.m. About two hours later the brother went up to his room and found him dead.

W.C.T.U.—The annual meeting of the W.C.T.U. took place at the home of Mrs. L. M. Poole, city, yesterday evening. A very pleasant time was spent. \$25 was given to the Marie Anne Girls Home in Truro. This was the last meeting till September, when they will resume their regular meetings, taking up patriotic work for the winter.

A TRIBUTE.—Referring to the recent death in Victoria, B. C., of Mrs. Henry Lawson, the Colonist of that city said: Last evening, June 11th, another old, resident of Victoria, Mrs. Henry Lawson, aged 85, passed away to her rest and this community is the poorer in the loss of one who through more than a quarter of a century adorned a home, a prominent characteristic of which has always been unstinted hospitality to the very many whose privilege it has been to enter it. The deceased lady was the widow of Henry Lawson, for eight years editor of the Colonist. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. McKenzie who, in the early part of the last century, arrived in Prince Edward Island from Scotland. Born in Wheatley River, P. E. I., on June 1, 1830, Flora McKenzie spent her girlhood's days there, and in 1852 was married to Henry Lawson, who for many years prior to his coming to British Columbia, in the late eighties, was a prominent journalist in the Maritime Provinces.
