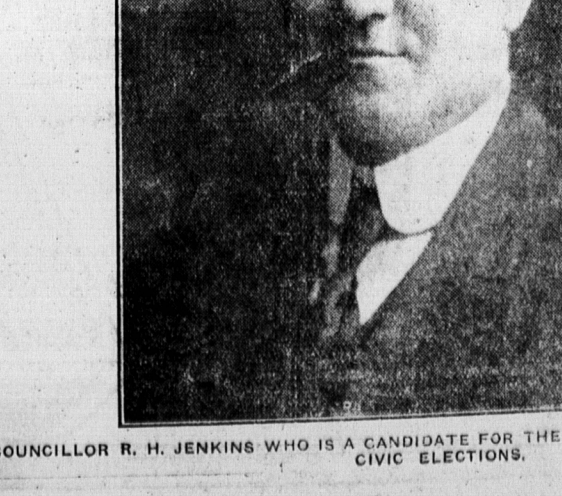

PARDON ARRIVED TOO LATE LIFE PRISONER WAS DEAD

KINGSTON, Ont., Feb. 7.—The death of Alphonse Barro, a life prisoner in Portsmouth Penitentiary on Wednesday, is another case of "The pardon came too late." It is stated that when Barro's condition was such to be hopeless and that the disease was inoperable, strong representations were made to the Government on his behalf and asking that he be permitted to die outside of the walls. Before action was taken, however, the prisoner began to sink, and he was dead when the authorization for his liberation was received.

NEGRO DRIVER MISSING

WINCHESTER, Virginia, Feb. 7.—A motor truck loaded with more than 1,000 pounds of dynamite skidded on ice, damaged over a retaining wall on the Sandhollow Valley pike today at Fishers Hill, and rolled nearly sixty feet to the bottom of the hill. The dynamite did not explode, but the driver, who is said to have escaped unhurt, has not been seen since the accident.

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, Feb. 8.—Prime Minister Lloyd George speaking in the House of Commons this afternoon extolled the Washington Conference as one of the greatest achievements ever registered in the history of the world.

Whips Arranging Members' Seats

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, Feb. 7.—The somewhat delicate question of arranging the seating of the parties in the new House of Commons is to be settled if possible this week. W. A. Bois, chief whip of the Conservatives and Fred Johnston, chief whip of the Progressives are both here today. J. J. Pappineau, Liberal whip, is expected to arrive this afternoon though a chief has not been definitely appointed for the government party.

No Settlement Yet Over Boundaries

LONDON, Feb. 6.—After a number of important conferences in London today between the southern Irish leaders, Premier Lloyd George and members of the British cabinet, between Sir James Craig, the Ulster premier, and the members of his cabinet, and finally, this afternoon, between Sir James and Lloyd George, a solution of the difficulty over the question of using the Ulster boundaries apparently had not been found. Statements issued tonight by Michael Collins, head of the provisional government in Ireland, and the Ulster premier indicate that they still are far from an agreement. "The authorities must seek," the provisional government head declared in a statement to the press regarding the boundary controversy, "the Ulster premier in the other hand, in a letter which he sent to the Ulster cabinet meeting after the Ulster cabinet meeting, declared the Ulsterites could not consent to alteration of the boundary except by mutual agreement. In the other hand, the government of Ireland last of 1920 must be looked upon as having accepted the boundaries of any disputed area." Sir James said the Ulsterites would adhere to the principle laid down by the prime minister in his letter to the Ulster cabinet meeting, but that an Irish settlement must fully recognize the Ulster government's existing powers and privileges which only Ulster could abrogate. A significant point about the letter is that it invokes the governing statute of Ireland Act as governing boundary disputes and fails to allude to the treaty which provides for a boundary commission. Subsequently, Sir James told Mr. Lloyd George personally that the decision of the Ulsterites must stand. Special despatches from Belfast report that strong representations are being forwarded to the Ulster premier from all sections of Ulster Unionists to the effect...

Milling Case Continued at Supreme Court

The case of the Charlottetown Milling Company vs. Canadian Fairbanks' Siding Company, was continued before Mr. Justice Hazzard and jury at Supreme Court yesterday. Mr. W. B. LePage, first witness for the plaintiff, was on the stand all day and gave evidence regarding the establishment of the four mills and the quality of flour produced which is claimed to be of a high grade as guaranteed by Mr. Morley, the Fairbanks' company agent. Seven communications between plaintiff and defendants were submitted in evidence. Witness testified that Mr. Thompson, the expert sent down at the request of the local company had examined the plant thoroughly and declared he could not produce flour to the number of bushels per barrel of wheat as guaranteed by Mr. Morley, but would require 4 bushels to 4 1/2 of No. 1 northern wheat per barrel. Mr. Inman objected to the admission in evidence of Mr. Thompson's report, as Mr. Thompson, the expert who inspected the plant at the Fairbanks' mill, was not acting in the capacity of the company's agent at the time. The court admitted the report, however.

Italy is Rejoicing Over New Pontificate

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Customs and Taxation Depts. May be Merged

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, Feb. 8.—A careful investigation into the taxation branch of the Department of Finance has been instituted by Hon. W. S. Fielding, the new minister. Rumor has it that some day this branch will be transferred to the Customs Department. Mr. Fielding taking the view that all collection should be made by the latter. In the meantime however, the new government desires to ascertain the manner in which the Income Tax and War Profits Tax Acts have been administered with a view towards collecting whatever arrears may exist. It is fairly apparent that difficulty will be encountered under present business depression in collecting arrears. Nevertheless the new government will make its best endeavor to trace delinquents and force payment.

The Civic Accounts Citizen's Reply

Sir.—The Citizens' Meeting in the Market Hall on Monday night was well attended and the addresses of the different speakers were listened to with close attention, which showed the desire of the citizens to be fully informed as to the different items of receipts and expenditures, and also as to the financial standing of the City. The Chairman of the Finance Committee in dealing with the expenditure over the various items for which money had been spent during the past two years, it is not necessary to refer to any of these items but when it came to dealing with the receipts and expenditure on Capital Account the Chairman was not so frank in his explanations to the audience. He dwelt specially on the item of \$8,000 received from the sale of Powell Wharf to show that this full amount had not been used for ordinary expenditure. He stated that out of this \$8,000 they had paid the mortgage on the Binney property \$2,500, they had opened a new account in the Union Bank of Canada for Permanent Work and had placed to the credit of that account \$3,200, and if my hearing was correct, he stated that they had also placed the sum of \$1,700 to increase the Market House sinking fund.
