## THE ALASKAN BOUNDARY

### Discussed by Sir Charles Tupper and Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

## JUSTICE IS ON CANADA'S SIDE

### Build a Railway and Issue No Mining Licenses To Foreigners, Says Sir Charles—War or Compromise Both out of Question, but do Not Despair of Arbitration, says Sir Wilfrid.

OTTAWA, July 22.—(Special)—In the Commons today Sir Charles Tupper brought up the Alaska Boundary question. He pointed out the unjustifiable position the United States had pursued and show its newspapers blamed Canada because there had not been a settlement reached.

He said the refusal of the United States to accept arbitration justified England and Canada in not allowing the question to go before the commission again.

There was a limit to our endurance. If Britain had done the same with France the Nile would have been lost to her.

The United States should be dealt with as civilized countries are treated. He hoped the Government would

take definite action and Sir Charles pointed out that this could be accomplished by building a railway through our own territory and to issue no mining licenses except to British subjects.

Premier Laurier said he sympathized with what Sir Charles Tupper had said, but the latter had greater latitude for his speech than he himself.

Canada had justice on her side. There were only two ways to settle such a question; one was by war; the other by arbitration.

War was out of the question. Settlement by compromise was also out of the question. He did not yet despair of arbitration. What we had to do was to be patient. In the meantime the propositions made by Sir Charles Tupper would be considered.

## DUE TO CIGARETTES.

### Twelve-Year-Old New York Girl Claimed to be Hopelessly Insane.

NEW YORK, July 19.—Cigarette smoking has wrecked the mind of Mamie King, only 12 years old, who but a short time was a bright and pretty girl. Now she sits in a cell at the East 126th street police station, a lunatic, with pitiful lackluster eyes. She will go to the Bellevue hospital insane pavilion tomorrow, and thence to a lunatic asylum, perhaps to spend the balance of her days staring in vacancy and jabbering meaningless sentences.

The girl lived with her father, Peter King, in a flat at 438 East 160th street. There, every minute she wasn't working, she had a cigarette in her mouth. If she woke in the night and could not find a cigarette she became almost hysterical. The climax was reached to-day, when the girl locked herself in her room with a package of cigarettes. By and by the father could hear her jabbering to herself. Then he tried to induce her to open the door, but she said she would throw herself through the window into the airshaft. He hurried to the station house and asked for help.

Policeman Drum went into the adjoining flat, and there found a window overlooking the room in which the girl was raving. Without making any noise he climbed out and reached her window. When she saw the officer she made a frantic effort to jump out, and gave the policeman a fierce struggle.
