### Tells Story of Men Who Serve on Ship

#### Lives of Many Bound Together In Life Of Destroyer Torrin

The story of a destroyer, the H. M. S. Torrin which went down in the Battle of Crete, Noel Coward's "In Which We Serve," which is due for its local premiere today at the Prince Edward Theatre through United Artists release, shows in dramatic manner how the men who sail in this ship are bound to her in love and sacrifice, yet live their own lives apart in the warm circle of their families. From the launching of the Torrin, until its last moments when it lies sadly on its side in the war-torn Mediterranean, it is the ship in which they serve steadfastly and gallantly, and for whose glory many of them lose their lives under the bombs of the enemy. Yet behind this life of members of the Royal Navy, who keep the ship's guns blazing until the waters of the sea flow over them, is their own life as husband or lover or father. As the Torrin sinks at Crete and the survivors cling to a rubber float awaiting rescue, the camera returns us to scenes in the lives of some of them—of Captain Kinross played by Noel Coward, of his Chief Petty Officer, Walter Hardy, and of Ordinary Seaman

### Gestapo Chief Called To Keep Bulgarians In Line

#### Germans Keeping Close Watch On Turkish Moves.

LONDON, May 14.—(AP)—Hitler's strong-arm specialist, Gestapo Chief Heinrich Himmler, was reported hurrying to Sofia tonight at the urgent call of King Boris to help keep the Bulgarians in line while German military experts strengthen defences there against the possibility of an Allied blow in the Balkans. The Wilhelmstrasse meanwhile was reported keeping the closest watch on Turkey, which has pacts of Alliance with Britain and non-aggression with Germany, was ready and willing to fight on the side of justice in fulfillment of her obligations. "Turkey will always stick to her obligations," the broadcast quoted

the Turkish Foreign Minister. An Algiers radio broadcast recorded by The Associated Press said Nazi defences in Bulgaria and Greece were being directed by Field Marshal Erwin Rommel.

#### Unrest Continues

Meanwhile, embattled Netherlands and Belgian Patriots were reported still snarling German communications. Dutch officers and men despite 43 executions. Indications of new unrest in France were seen in the Gestapo roundup of 200 members of the Vichy Government suspected of entering into secret communication with French resistance groups or Allied agents.

It was reported reliably that Grand Admiral Karl Doenitz, commander-in-chief of the German Navy, had moved his headquarters from Paris to Kiel because he felt unsafe in France.

Fighting French headquarters here disclosed for the first time tonight that French resistance groups had been brought under a central authority—the council of French resistance operating in France is linked to Gen. Charles De Gaulle. The German press discussed for the first time a prospective Allied European invasion from North Africa.

### Would Probe Gov't Aid To Aluminum Company

OTTAWA, May 14.—(CP)—A request that government financial aid be granted to the aluminum company of Canada be subject of a Royal Commission Inquiry, and that Leighton McCarthy, Canadian Minister to Washington, be recalled for questioning on this matter, was made today in the House of Commons by M. J. Coldwell, C.C.F. leader.

He said the assistance given the company by Britain, the United States and Canada to finance wartime expansion, including the huge Shipshaw, Que., power dam, enabled the corporation to strengthen its

monopoly of power and aluminum production.

Mr. Coldwell brought Mr. McCarthy into the picture when he questioned the part Mr. McCarthy played in the deal with the United States in the latter's capacity as Canadian Minister while occupying the position of vice-president of the American Aluminum Company which is the parent company, and as a director of the Aluminum company of Canada.

Minister Minister Howe spoke for the government and declared that it was unwarranted to attack Mr. McCarthy who was a retired business man giving his services, late in life, as a patriotic duty.

He said he had personal knowledge that Mr. McCarthy had nothing to do with any of the transactions between the United States interests and the Aluminum Company of Canada. The Minister said further that no inquiry could produce a better plan to increase production of aluminum desperately needed for war aircraft than the one adopted.

If some ultimate advantage accrued to the corporation it should be weighed against the advantage of being able to furnish 40 per cent of the aluminum used by the United Nations.

The debate arose over third reading of the \$1,000,000,000 bill for granting mutual aid to the United Nations.

S. H. Knowles (C.C.F. Winnipeg North Centre) and J. F. Pouliot (Lib. Temiskouata) spoke briefly before the bill was finally passed and sent to the Senate.

The House then turned to consideration of the \$3,890,000,000 war appropriation bill for the current fiscal year with Defence Minister Raiston resuming his account of the Army's operations which he began last night.

Before the House settled down to routine business Trade Minister MacKinnon announced that the maximum wheat delivery quota was being raised from 14 to 15 bushels an authorized acre and that the oats quota restriction had been removed at 576 delivery points.

When debate opened on third reading of the mutual aid bill Mr. Coldwell opened his attack upon the aluminum deal but emphasized that his group was not opposing the gift of war supplies to United Nations.

"We support the free transfer of goods to our allies but we criticize severely profits and gifts to private corporations which these transfers involve.

"Under the necessities of war giant monopolies in Canada are strengthening their economic control and endangering the future of democracy.

"Of these monopolies I think the outstanding example is the aluminum company of Canada."
