ST. JOHN, March 7.—Dr. George J. Wherrett, former Maritime Director of the Canadian Tuberculosis Association and traveling diagnostician in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, has received word that he has been successful in passing the examination for membership of the Royal College of Physicians. He has spent the last 12 months taking post-graduate work in London, England, and, accompanied by his wife, returned to Canada in February on the S. S. Regina, landing in Halifax. They have spent the last few weeks renewing old acquaintances in these provinces, where Dr. Wherrett is widely known, and they left on Thursday for Saskatchewan, where the doctor has accepted a position in the Qu'Appelle Sanatorium.

Subsequently Premier MacDonald told newspapermen that a treaty would be produced. "The conference is going to produce a treaty. That treaty must be specific. It must lay down an agreement in words which are of accurate legal value," it was declared. "It must supplement these words with programs which have been agreed upon as being programs which if carried out would not carry a menace to other nations. And Premier MacDonald despite his air of weariness takes up the work again with undiminished optimism. He believes the work can be done and that it is going to be done. When the heads of the delegations met, their first task was to send a message of sympathy with the sufferers in the French floods. M. Briand expressed France's appreciation of the message.
