By George Ronald WASHINGTON, June 13 (CP) — The United States Senate today ratified the International Wheat Agreement, designed to stabilize world wheat prices during the next four years.

What now remains is for enough of the importing countries to approve the pact to guarantee a market for at least 70 per cent of the total quantity.

Under the agreement among five major wheat exporting countries and 36 importing countries 456,273,300 bushels will be exchanged each year on a sliding price scale.
