Though the call was sudden it found her prepared, as Mrs. McLeod had long ago given her heart and soul to the keeping of her Saviour in whom she believed and trusted. The deceased was for many years an active and faithful member of the Baptist Church at Bidon, and in the different societies of the Church she was a prominent worker and will be much missed. But it is especially in her home that her loss is irreparable, as it was in the bosom of her family that her heart's deepest affections were enshrined. Mrs. McLeod was in her 63rd year. Her maiden name was Sarah Hooper. Besides a sorrowing husband, she leaves to mourn her loss, two children, Dan and Lila, both at home; also one sister Mrs. Isaac Geddings, of Murray Harbor North, and three brothers, two in Boston and one in Murray River. The remains were laid to rest on the 4th June in the beautiful cemetery of Belfast, followed by a large concourse of friends who thus testified their regard for the deceased, and their sympathy with the bereaved.—Com. 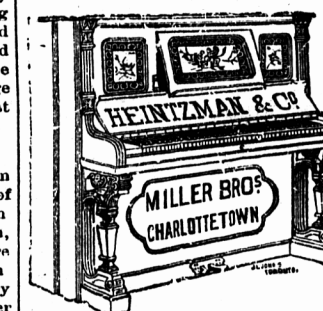
