BALKAN SITUATION.

BERLIN, Oct. 5.—The German foreign office and the inspired newspapers continue to be markedly pessimistic in connection with the chances of outbreak in the Balkans. This feeling, however, is not consonant with yesterday's spirit on Bourse where a strong recovery took place.

There was heavy buying throughout the day and this was attributed to the improved prospect of a peaceful solution.

The Foreign Office has not received any information as to presentation to Turkey of memorandum of the Balkan States or of any joint action by Powers.

GREEKS IN CANADA.

MONTREAL, Oct. 5.—J. Ponsoby, Greek Consul of Montreal, received a communication yesterday from the Government of Greece, instructing him to take necessary steps to inform all Greeks, both in Montreal and throughout Canada, that they would be expected to leave the country at once and fight for the Fatherland.

Emphasis was made in the communication of the great necessity of Greeks obeying this command immediately.

Mr. Sexton stated that he would put an advertisement in Canadian papers notifying the Greeks in Canada.

STOCK NOTES.

The Sheep Commission, who visited this Province in the month of August were impressed with the advantages Prince Edward Island offered for the production of superior wool and mutton. They found, however, that sufficient attention had not been paid to breeding, but that grade rams were being used even in fairly large flocks. To bring high class pure bred rams within reach of everyone they have purchased a number from the leading breeders of Canada and the United States and will offer some of them by public auction at Summerside, Hunter River, Mt. Stewart and Melville. Full information can be had from the Dept. of Agriculture.

NOBB'S RUDDER FAILED TO STAND TEST.

HALIFAX, Oct. 5.—The cruiser Niobe will sail for England at the end of November, after more than a year in the drydock. The officers and sailors will be glad once more to be afloat.

The warship would have been able to get away nearly a month earlier had it not been for the fact that her new rudder, being made by Maxim's limited, was rejected at the admiralty test, and another casting had to be made. The second test has not yet been heard from if made.

It is very unusual for a rudder thus to fail to pass a test, but, as one of the officers said, it is just the weeping Niobe's luck.

The work on the cruiser would be practically finished if the rudder were here.
