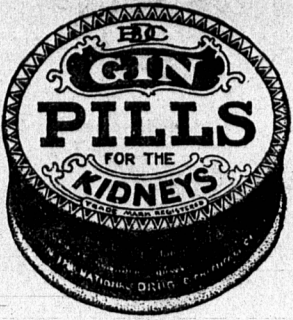

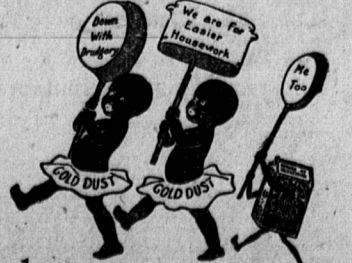

AGED CITIZENS DEAD.—Messrs. Donald Johnston, aged 80 years, Rodrick McSwain, aged 80 years, John McDonald, aged 70 years, all of the lead of Cardigan, died during the past week and were laid to rest in the cemetery at Lorne Valley.

PREPARING STATISTICS.—The Sheep Breeders' Association would like to collect Statistics of all Sheep killed by dogs in 1914, and would like anyone having had sheep killed by dogs or knowing of sheep having been so killed to send particulars to Theodore Ross, Secretary, Sheep Breeders' Association.

TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE.—The annual meeting of the Provincial Temperance Alliance will be held in the Kithcarten Hall on Thursday and Friday, 11th and 12th March. All churches and temperance societies and organizations are requested to send delegates. A large attendance is expected, as important issues are to be discussed.

LETTERS PATENT.—The last issue of the Royal Gazette contains the notice of incorporation by letters patent of the "North River Pure Bred Sland Mink Company, Limited," with a total capital stock of \$14,000, divided into 500 shares of \$25 each. The object of the company is to enter all ranches of the fur industry, and all business as may be incidental thereto.

OFFER PRIZES.—Last year the representatives of the third district of Queens County in the Provincial Legislature offered special prizes open to their district in the Central Seed Fair, and they are again making a similar offer. Dr. Dewar, M. L. A., and H. F. Feehan, M. L. A., offered \$500 for the largest and most creditable exhibit in the grain and potato classes open to the competitors of the third district of Queens County as follows: First prize, \$150; Second, \$125; Third, \$100; Fourth, \$75; Fifth, \$50, and for the largest and most creditable exhibit in the Household Science section, \$500 divided in a similar manner. The rules and regulations of the Seed Fairs govern these exhibits.

Y. M. C. A. APPEAL.—Mr. Cross, the Secretary cheerfully telephoned the success of the directors canvass within the last couple of days. It would look now as if the amount would be over subscribed by the citizens who are anxious to see the institution continue. The following amounts are gratefully acknowledged: George E. Hughes \$20; F. J. Holman \$10; A. Friend \$5; Isaac Holman \$10; Dr. Levingstone Mays \$5; Mrs. R. M. Johnston \$10; A. Friend \$10; Matthew Leard, Alberton \$5; Wm. Agnew, Charlottetown, \$15; Alex. Horne \$10; J. E. Burnett \$5; Mrs. L. M. Poole, \$10. This amount totals \$115 which being added to the \$330 already subscribed makes the total amount \$445. It should be explained that some of the old sustaining members of these lists have increased their giving to the amount of \$35. This deducted from the total makes the amount necessary to complete the new sustaining membership subscription \$90. The directors intend having a special meeting tonight to go over the entire work of the Association and form plans to permanently carry on the work. It is hoped that the remaining amount of \$90 will be forthcoming as a result of their canvass this week. It may be stated that citizens have received the directors most cordially and have done their best to help on the work.

A SAD ENDING.—By looking at the auction sale notices posted in all conspicuous places around here advertising the sale of household effects, etc., of Peter Robertson, of St. Louis, on the 3rd of March, next, one stops and realises what the old adage, "The way of the transgressor is hard," means. In this man, who settled in St. Louis last summer and soon was doing a splendid business as a house-painter, besides keeping a boarding-house, the lure to make money fast by illegal selling of beer and other stimulants was too great. A SERIOUS RUNAWAY.—An accident which might have had more serious results happened on the ice between Mont Carmel and Cape Egmont recently, when Mr. John P. Gallant, of Cape Egmont, who was hauling logs to the saw mill, got one of his horses crippled. Mr. Gallant as usual was returning home from the mill by the ice along the shore, when his horses suddenly made speed. In endeavoring to check them the sleigh touched them on the heels. Being without check straps the animals walked on their traces and broke three of them. One of the horses sustained severe injuries on the hind leg, the leader being broken half way between the foot and the knee. Mr. Gallant did not receive any injury. Help came and the injured animal was put in a sleigh and hauled home. Veterinary John T. Cosgrove was immediately summoned and bandaged the injured leg and the horse is likely to recover.—R.

FIELD ARTILLERY WANTED.—Yesterday the following telegram was received by Captain T. E. MacNutt: "Recruits are now wanted for Overseas Battery of Field Artillery. Men with artillery experience preferred. Drivers required who can ride and are used to care of horses." This is an opportunity for artillerymen who may desire to enlist for service with the third contingent. It is not, however, necessary to have previous training so the chance is now again open for young men to offer their services to their King and Country. Those wishing to enlist should for the present correspond or report to Captain T. E. MacNutt, Charlottetown.

INFANTRY RECRUITING CLOSED.—Yesterday Captain T. E. MacNutt received a wire from Headquarters Sixth Division stating that recruiting for infantry was to cease as the Regiment was complete. This speaks well for the patriotic spirit of the Maritime Provinces as a whole, as almost eleven hundred men were raised for the 40th Infantry Battalion in about three weeks. It is, however, to be regretted that the number from P. E. Island is not nearly as large as it ought to be. Irvine, Wood Islands; Gordon McKay, Murray Harbour; Ronald Gauthier, North Rustico; Henry W. Gallant, Summerside; Ambrose Mahar, Charlottetown; Theo. Arsenault, Abram's Village.

BEAUTIFUL PRAYER.—The following beautiful "prayer for mothers," which we no doubt are of interest to readers of the Guardian, was written by a clergyman in Charlottetown: "O God, we offer Thee praise and benediction for the sweet ministries of motherhood in human life. We bless Thee for our own dear mothers who built up lives by theirs; who bore us in travail and loved us the more for the pain we gave; who nourished us at their breast and hushed us to sleep in the warm security of their arms. We thank Thee, O God, for their tireless love; we thank Thee for their prayers which had no voice and were heard by Thee alone. We thank Thee for the pain and agony with which they followed up through our sins and won us back. We thank Thee for the Christly power of sacrifice and redemption in mother-love. We pray Thee to forgive us if in thoughtless selfishness, we have taken their love as our due without giving the tenderness which they craved as their sole reward. And if the great treasure of a mother's love is still spared to us, may we do for her feebleness what she did for ours."

WILL FILED.—The will of the late Mrs. Dodd has been admitted to probate. The value of the entire estate is set at \$46,000. The chief beneficiaries under the will are: F. Walker Ings (her adopted son), to whom she leaves in trust the sum of \$20,000; to her sister, Mrs. Julia F. Pope, she leaves \$1,000 absolutely; to her sister, Mrs. I. A. Sears, \$1,000 absolutely; to her niece, Ruth Parker, \$1,000 absolutely; to her niece, Mollie Ellis \$1,000 absolutely; to the Church of England, Zanana Mission, \$1,000; to the Clergy's Widows and Orphans' Fund of the Church of England, \$1,000; to St. Paul's Episcopal Church and Sunday School, Charlottetown, \$500 each; to five named friends, \$100 each; to her housekeeper, Lizzie McInnis, \$500 and other benefits. After directing the disposition of various articles of her household and other personal effects, she directs the sale of the remainder thereof and the division of the net proceeds equally between the Prince Edward Island and Charlotte town Hospitals. Her wardrobe, jewelry, etc., she distributed amongst her relatives and intimate friends. The residue of her estate is to be divided equally between the minister, church wardens and vestry of St. Paul's Church, Charlottetown, the Clergy's Widow and Orphans' Fund, the Prince Edward Island Hospital and the Charlottetown Hospital. The executor named are Hon. F. L. Hazard and Mr. Gilbert Gaudet.
