**CANADA'S TRADE ON THE INCREASE**

**Imperial Government's Trade Statistics Issued.**

**Hon Joseph Chamberlain will Modify His Proposals, Canada Has Been Again Attacked By Labouchers.**

LONDON, Sept. 16—On the heels of Premier Balfour's academic exposition of his personal views of the fiscal problem contained in the pamphlet on "Insular Free Trade," advance sheets of which were issued last night, came the long promised and much demanded government statistics dealing with that subject. They were issued this morning by the board of trade, in the shape of a bluebook of nearly 500 pages of bewildering tables of figures showing the various aspects of British and foreign trade and the industrial conditions. No deductions were drawn, though the publication teems with interesting notes upon what are regarded as points of fact. The references to foreign trade were chiefly confined to France, Germany and the United States.

The Pall Mall Gazette says it understands the cabinet has concluded the consideration of its fiscal position and its policy in regard thereto, that no further cabinet meetings will be held for the present, probably not until late in the autumn, and that in the meanwhile Colonial Secretary Chamberlain will proceed with his expository programme. The paper adds:

"It will probably be found that he has modified his proposals so as to bring them in harmony with Mr. Balfour's views as set forth in the pamphlet. The main feature of Mr. Chamberlain's modification

ions will be the disappearance of all suggestion in favour of the further taxation of goods and raw materials. Consideration of the war commission's report is reserved for future meetings of the cabinet."

The Pall Mall Gazette believes it is still possible that there will be more than one resignation from the cabinet.

LONDON, Sept. 16—The board of trade returns dealing with trade between the United Kingdom, Canada and Germany, shows the value of imports to Germany from Canada in 1902 to have been £472,000, as compared with £370,000 in 1901, £209,000 in 1897, and £104,000 in 1895. The value of exports from Germany to Canada in 1902 were £1,037,000 as compared with £1,325,000 in 1901, £388,000 in 1897, £316,000 in 1895.

Proportionately the imports to Germany from Canada have grown more rapidly than exports from Germany. Imports from Canada into the United Kingdom in 1902 amounted to £22,965,000, as compared with £19,855,000 in 1901, £10,213,000 in 1897 and £12,798,000 in 1895. The total exports from the United Kingdom to Canada in 1902 were £11,906,000, in 1901 £9,250,000, in 1895, £3,528,000.

The total trade between the United Kingdom and the Dominion in 1902 was £34,961,000, whereas in 1892 it was £21,000,000.

Chamberlain, replying to a correspondent, denied ever having received broad hints from any one of the colonies that they desired separation from the British empire.

Truth in a lengthy article on labor as an export says it would be extremely interesting to know the real truth as to openings for immigrants otherwise than farming that at present exists in Canada. The Canadian government is doing its best to import not merely farmers, but workers of all classes, but labor organizations resist this policy.

Truth quotes two Toronto letters as showing that a direct conflict of opinion prevails on the subject. Truth compares the cost of living in Canada with that in England as a warning to the British emigrant tempted to emigrate to Canada. The article concluding says, that even the most ardent imperialist must note the facility of the emigration process when so many settlers transported to Canada for the purpose of increasing the number of the brethren across the sea drift in the course of a year or two into the United States.

**WILL VISIT PARIS.**

ROME, Sept. 14—It is officially announced that the King and Queen, accompanied by Vice-Admiral Moran, the Foreign Minister, will go to Paris, Oct. 14, and remain until Oct. 18.
