"IT HAPPENED IN BROOKLYN," WITH FOUR GREAT STARS, DELIGHTFUL MGM MUSICAL

Frank Sinatra, Kathryn Grayson, Peter Lawford and the inimitable Jimmy Durante are the stars of M-G-M's inspirational new musical, "It Happened in Brooklyn," current attraction at the Prince Edward Theatre, and they comprise a four-star musical delight.

Sinatra is the music publishing-house shipping clerk who is convinced that his home town of Brooklyn is the most wonderful place in the world, Miss Grayson is the girl who has turned to teaching when she is persuaded that her voice lacks the romantic warmth for grand opera, Lawford is the shy, English songwriter who has never heard of five, in consequence of which his songs tend to turn him into the Funeral March King, and Durante has the time of his life in the role of an hospitable school janitor who takes them under his wing and tempers their troubles with his sunny disposition.

BOWERY BOYS DUE IN "NEWS HOUNDS"

Leo Gorcey and the Bowery Boys attempt to break up a sports "fix" and are threatened with dire consequences by a powerful syndicate in Monogram's "News Hounds," which comes to the Capitol Theatre Thursday. The latest Bowery Boys comedy has a newspaper background, and the story promises many unusual laugh situations above the roar of the presses.
