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Two No-Hit Games Hurled Yesterday

High Bidding In Sight As Suffolk Downs Goes On Block

(By Bill King) (AP)—With at least six groups qualified by the posting of \$100,000 certified cheques, a wild flurry of bidding for the millions appeared assured for tomorrow's court-ordered auction of the controlling interest in Boston's Suffolk Downs horse racing track.

One of the prospective bidders, William B. Kyne of San Francisco, general manager of the Bay Meadows track in California and Portland Meadows, now under construction in Oregon, indicated his willingness to bid "almost three millions."

Among the others who will announce their bids tomorrow are Henry Simberg, Boston ice cream manufacturer; Maurice Simon, Boston lawyer; Milton Gould, New York lawyer and, according to some reports, a representative of Joseph P. Kennedy, former United States Ambassador to the Court of St. James.

Last year the Aldred Investment Trust was ordered into receivership by the federal court here. Receivers operated the track last year.

Suffolk Downs was built in 1935 at a reported cost of \$2,700,000 by a group headed by Charles Adams of Boston. Adams then held a controlling interest in the Boston National League baseball club and was forced to sell it to Kenesaw Mountain Landis, late commissioner of baseball, who sold it to a syndicate of horse racing interests.

In the other game yesterday, Pittsburgh Pirates took advantage of a wild throw by Tommy Hughes on Frankie Gustine's bunt to break an eighth inning tie and go on to defeat Philadelphia Phillies 4-1 before a film crowd at Pittsburgh.

Brooklyn's defeat dumped them half a game behind St. Louis, whose scheduled game with New York Giants was washed out. The Boston-Cincinnati game also was rained out.

Cubs tied the count at 1-1 with two out in the ninth on pitcher Heinz Becker's single which scored Eddie Watkins. Kuhn, who never drank, smoked and smoked during the game, pitched a blazer on his pitching hand when the Brooks filled the bases on three free passes.

Walkus Leads Attack

Walkus, who paced the Cub 12th-inning hit by three singles, led off in the 11th with a blow to left, took second on Clyde McCullough's sacrifice, went to third on Stu Sturrock's single and came home easily when reliever Hugh Casey blew up and walked Don Davidson.

 Three stars were added to baseball's Hall of Fame when Joe Tinker, Johnny Evers and Frank Chance were accepted in this year's balloting. It is until this trio were baseball's most famous double play combination and one was never mentioned without the other. Tinker is the only member of that great Cub infield still connected with baseball.

Chance the first baseman is dead and Evers was dangerously ill last year.

When those three names are mentioned their famous feud is always recalled. It was said that they quarrelled over a play on the ball field and never spoke to one another for 30 years. Recently Evers admitted that he and Tinker never spoke for two years but he did not disclose any reason. Tinker denied the rumor that they remained enemies until the year after they quit playing and said the patched up their differences after a ball game in Philadelphia.

Now scouting "teen-age ball talent" down South, Tinker expects to get additional thrills in the youngsters he recommends make good in big time ball. He related an embarrassing story when he was guest of honor at a dinner given by some admirers. The party was going good when the host stood up to prepare a toast—"to the greatest shortstop in baseball history." Tinker got red in the face and tried to close him up but he continued—"to the greatest shortstop in baseball history—Honus Wagner."

Louis Will Carry Fight To Conn In June Title Clash

 NEW YORK, April 30—(AP)—Heavyweight champion Joe Louis today announced his plan to carry the fight to Billy Conn "all the way" in their war-postponed return bout June 18 at Yankee Stadium.

Arriving here from Indiana to begin serious training for the defence of his title, the bulging boxer disclosed his plan in response to a question as to just how he intended to start getting "wound up" after several years of ring idleness.

"I got just one thing in mind," he replied. "That's to keep going for my bobbin and weavin' and keepin' my hands out in front all the time. I'm going to carry the fight to Billy Conn all the way this time."

He permitted Conn to do most of the leading in their first meeting in '41, and the Pittsburgher made it too close for comfort until Joe landed on him in the 13th round.

Joe is bigger than he was when he went into the army. He weighed 216 today, having scaled down from 221 during two months of constant golf and road work at West Baden. He said he would weigh in at about 208 for the title fight, compared to the 190 and a fraction pounds he had on Conn's last time.

The champion appears to have added some solid flesh around the back of his neck and shoulders, and Manny Seaman, his trainer, expressed the belief he might even have taken on a fraction of an inch in height while in the service.

Red Sox Strengthen Lead Defeating Detroit Tigers 4-0

 With Bobby Feller fireballing his way through New York Yankees with a 1-0, no-hit no-run win over New York Yankees to highlight yesterday's National League program, Boston Red Sox quietly strengthened their grip on first place by defeating Detroit Tigers 4-0 in their smooth pitching performance.

Righthander Joe Dobson turned in his first straight win with a three-hit job, while Hal Newhouse on the Detroit mound was giving up eight bingles. Each pitcher had nine strikeouts, but Newhouse presented the Soxers with their first run on a wild pitch.

Meanwhile, the cellar-dwelling Philadelphia Athletics came to life to hammer St. Louis Browns 12-8 at Shibe Park, while the seventh-place Washington Senators were beating Chicago White Sox 3-2 at the capitol.

Dobson got good support at Boston, with Bobby Doerr slashing a home run, Steve Gromek a double, and Dom DiMaggio and Rudy York contributing doubles. Hank Greenberg won the decision, but came out third when Dick Wakefield beat out an infield roller. Dobson tightened up then and forced Pat Mullin to ground out.

Buddy Lewis won the game for Senators with a seventh-inning home run, while the right-hander line after a single and a sacrifice set the stage. Ray Scarborough chased up his second win in the ninth inning, something that the left-hander hitting Senators nudged Ed Lopat, the fourth southpaw they've beaten this season.

Five bases on balls by St. Louis pitchers gave Athletics a boost as they tied the score in the eighth inning and added eight more later to chalk up their third win of the season.

Feller Halts Yanks With A Masterly Mound Performance

 CLEVELAND, April 30—(AP)—Rapid Robert Feller, Cleveland's fire-balling right-hander, convinced 37,144 fans and New York Yankees today he isn't slipping—by brooding a no-hit no-run game against the Bronx Bombers for a 1-0 decision on Frankie Hayes' ninth-inning no-hitter.

The 27-year-old speedster walked five men and struck out 11, allowing only one Yankee to reach third base and resulting in his opening day no-hit feat of 1940 when he blanked Chicago by the same 1-0 score.

Never in the history of the Stadium and not since 1919 had a Yankee ball club been held without a single safety. Ray Caldwell of the Cleveland club did the job then in the first game of a double-header.

Just a week ago, Ed Head of Brooklyn Dodgers tossed a no-hitter against Boston Braves for the first near-perfect game since Sept. 8, 1946 when Toronto-born Dick Fowler of Philadelphia Athletics turned back St. Louis with a safe ball.

NEW YORK, April 30—(AP)—Bobby Feller delivered 133 pitches today in tossing his no-hit, no-run game against New York Yankees.

A press box compilation revealed the Cleveland speedster threw 54 balls, 35 strikes (17 called and 18 swinging), 29 fouls and 15 balls hit to infielders or outfielders.

Feller was pitching out of turn as it had been Alie Reynolds' turn to pitch the opening of the New York series. But when Monday's game was called out, Manager Lou Boudreau switched to Feller, slightly amused and just a little peeved at reports he was slipping because he had lost two of his first three starts.

Even so, Feller was strictly a drama of bat-against-ball. The opposing pitcher, Floyd Bennett, went all-out to win with Feller in an eight-inning scoreless tie, and the winning blow came off the bat of Bobby's catcher, Hayes.

Feller had several close calls before the ninth but allowed only five hits until Hayes smashed his first home run of the season. Phil Rizzuto drew a pass to open the sixth and was hunted over to second by George Stinseweiss but that was as far as he got.

There was drama in the ninth-inning finish as Stinseweiss got a life when Les Fleming let his bunt go through his legs for an error.
