Cake and coffee were then served in abundance by the young ladies. After the Grand Banquet was administered to the National Anthem all joined in wishing "God speed" and each member wished their way home feeling they had spent an enjoyable time.

A CANADIAN MISSION.—Last week's Presbyterian Witness contains the first installment of an account of the services in connection with the celebration of the Golden Jubilee of the Canadian mission in Trinidad which is of special interest to Presbyterians in this Province. The gatherings were held in Susannah church, San Fernando. Great interest was manifested in the proceedings by all denominations. Rev. Dr. Grant was unable to speak but he had prepared an address which was read by his son, T. Geddes Grant. Last year the Canadian church contributed \$42,000 to the mission. Other Canadian societies contributed \$18,000, so that a total of \$60,000 Canadian money was spent on the college building and work. The local contributions were on the increase. Last year they amounted to \$12,000. They have seventy schools and 14,000 pupils enrolled. There are besides Naparima College, teachers' training college, a theological training college and a girls' college. Between residential and extra mural classes there had a total of 300 students last year. They also had more than seventy men and women preachers and 4,500 children in their Sunday schools. The communion roll of the mission has 2,000 names while the Christian community numbers between 9,000 and 10,000. Last year the Christian Indians have built three churches at their own expense.

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Here is a tip for the gardener who wants extra early and tender radishes, lettuce, mustard and cress. It is a popular practice in France and Great Britain, but one that is little indulged in on this side of the Atlantic. All the salad crops can be induced to be more sprightly in their growth if the row or patch is covered with straw for three or four days after the seed has been sown. The straw shades the ground, keeps in the moisture and rapidly draws up the young seedlings.

The crop gets a good start if this is done and the tenderest of radishes, lettuce and onions shoot up and are ready for use at least a week earlier than they would otherwise be.

Total reports for Earn and Give is now 2,526 boys. Many places still not reported. On behalf of the National Earn and Give Committee I extend heartiest congratulations to you. The efficiency of the work of your committee and the hearty spirit with which you undertook the campaign has made success possible.

When it is remembered that Canada's objective was 6,000 boys the above speaks volumes for the magnificent spirit of Canadian teen age lads. 7,566 boys pledging themselves each to earn ten dollars and give it to the boy's part of the Red Triangle Fund and to return not yet completed!

Prince Edward Island's quota is 100 boys and already 65 boys are reported with only Summerside, Charlottetown, Montague and Georgetown heard from. Many of the rural districts and the townships are known to be doing splendid work but official reports are not yet in the hands of the committee. We understand that it is important that all district and local chairmen forward their results to date to the Secretary at Charlottetown, Mr. J. P. Gordon and the remainder of the week till Saturday will be allowed them to complete their campaign.
