TO STEER BRITISH EMIGRANTS TO THE COLONIES

LONDON, June 10.—The Imperial conference has resolved to continue the policy adopted in 1907 to encourage systematically emigrants from Great Britain to go to some of the British dominions rather than to a foreign country.

According to John Bull's statistics, the number of emigrants in 1906 was 194,671, of whom 54 per cent, went to the overseas dominions. In 1910 the number of emigrants was 233,344, of whom 68 per cent went to the dominions.

The first four months of 1911 show a big increase and if it be maintained it is figured that more than 300,000 emigrants will depart from Great Britain within the year.

OBITUARY.

The death occurred at his residence in Margate P. E. I., on Monday June 5th, after a lengthy illness of William P. E. I., of Margate, P. E. I., deceased, who was born in England, Feb. 1841. When quite young his parents immigrated to this Province and settled at Fredericton. In Nov. 21st, 1863, he was married to Maria Tuplin of Margate and a family of four sons and two daughters were born to them as follows: James T. Marshalltown, Iowa; Alfred M. Vancouver; William B. Winnipeg, and D. Moody, New Westminster. In 1867, the deceased started a large and extensive carriage building establishment in Margate now owned and controlled by Frank Marks a former apprentice. For a period of about forty years he held the largest patronage probably of any firm in this province. The deceased was a very painstaking and conscientious workman and by dint of honest toil, combined with good business integrity, pluck and perseverance earned for himself a province wide reputation. In the home he was loved and highly respected. In the community he was most popular with every one. With his wife and widow who survives him they were both charitable, courteous and kind to strangers. In him the poor always found support and help. Despite his constant suffering with rheumatism for many years he was genial and of unusual cheerful disposition. By his removal the community has incurred the loss of an estimable and highly esteemed citizen, being of a keen intellect pertaining to the best welfare of the country. He was once a candidate in by-election in the fourth district of Prince Edward Island, but was defeated. He was both a church and society man in general. His whole life in Margate had been a devoted and faithful example for those amongst whom his life was passed. Consoled and fortified by his strong faith in God alone, his soul quitted this vale of tears in the full confidence of a glorious immortality. The funeral service took place on Wednesday afternoon 3 p. m., and were conducted at his late residence and in the church by the pastor Rev. W. E. Johnson, assisted by Rev. E. H. Rattall of Malpeque both of whom paid high tributes to the life and character of the deceased, "Lead kindly light," "Nearer my God to thee," "Rock of ages" and other hymns selected by the request of the deceased were sung by the choir with good effect. Interment took place in the burial ground of the Methodist Church at Margate. Following were the pall-bearers: Andrew Johnson; Wm. Brown, Margate; Robt. Heaney John Connors, Clinton; John Woods, Kensington; and Michael Ready, Burlington. (Pioneer please copy.)

A DESTRUCTIVE FRUIT PEST

The Codling Moth and How to Control it by Spraying. By Theodore Ross.

The Codling Moth, the insect that makes the apples wormy, is the most destructive insect pest of apples, inflicting every year more than half the crop. The following article is intended to make more general a knowledge of its life history and habits, and the best methods of control.

In order to make what follows clearer, it might be well to state that insects pass through four distinct stages. (1) The moth itself, which lays the eggs. (2) These eggs hatch into tiny little worms or larvae. (3) When fully grown these worms or larvae spin a neat or cocoon for themselves, and crawl inside of it where they change into what is called. (4) a pupa from which in due time emerges the moth.

THE CODLING MOTH.

The codling moth is rarely seen. It flies only in the evening and at night. During the day it remains motionless on or under the bark which it closely resembles. It is very small, having a spread of not more than three quarters of an inch. In this stage they do no damage. They begin to lay their eggs a few days after they emerge from the cocoon which is from the last week of June to the middle of July. The average female lays from 50 to 60 eggs, one at a time, on each leaf or twig.

THE EGG.

The individual egg is nearly round, about the size of a small pinhead, and looks like a tiny white blister. They hatch in from 7 to 10 days, according to the temperature, or in from 3 to 4 weeks after the blossoms fall.

THE APPLE WORM OR LARVA.

When newly hatched, the larva is a tiny whitish caterpillar with a black shiny head not more than a sixteenth of an inch in length. If the egg was laid on the apple, the young larva seeks for a wound or scar by which it may enter. If it does not find any, in about 30 cases out of 100, it goes through the calyx. If the eggs were laid on the leaves or twigs, the larvae make at once for the fruit as if by instinct, and in nearly every case they enter the calyx, feed a little, there to appease their hunger and feeding in the blossom is of the utmost importance in the destruction of the worm as will appear later. It spends from 24 to 30 days in the fruit by which time it is almost fully grown. When nearly ready to leave, it makes a passage to the outside of the apple. It however, continues to feed till it reaches the proper stage when it comes out and at once seeks for a suitable place to make its cocoon.

THE COCOON.

The cocoon is the little nest of

resting place, where the worm or larva remains after it has ceased feeding and where it transforms into the pupa. In this stage it passes the winter. The cocoon is composed of whitish silken threads which the worm makes out of glands in its body. They are to be found under the rough bark on the trunks or larger branches of the trees; in holes or crevices in trees of fences or stones, etc.; in clusters of dead leaves; in boxes or barrels; in short, wherever they find a comfortable hiding place. As the weather grows warm in the Spring, they transform to moths and emerge during the months of June and July when they begin again to lay eggs.

METHODS OF CONTROL.

Many birds feed on the larvae of the Codling Moth, but the Woodpeckers and the Chickadees destroy many during the winter months. For this reason, both of these birds should be encouraged to stay in the orchard during the winter by hanging pieces of suet and fat meat on the trees from time to time. Again, a great number of the apples containing the worms fall to the ground. If then these apples were destroyed or taken away at once, the worms would not spin their cocoons on the tree. Again, bands of burlap placed around the trunk of the tree will catch many of them. The only sure and efficient remedy however, is spraying with a poison either Arsenate of Lead or Paris Green. As this is the time to prevent the Spot and Scab, they are generally used with Lime Sulphur and the Bordeaux Mixture. Up till very recently, the Bordeaux Mixture was the only fungicide used in Eastern Canada. For various reasons they are now almost entirely superseded by the Lime Sulphur wash and Arsenate of Lead. This mixture can be made at home, but unless a large quantity of it is required, it is better to buy the Commercial Lime Sulphur for summer spraying. For summer spraying, the Commercial Lime Sulphur should be diluted 1 to 35-40 according to strength, which can be determined only by a hydrometer and for the Codling by 3 lbs. of Arsenate of Lead to 40 gals. of the Mixture should be used. Paris Green must not be used with Lime Sulphur as it burns the foliage.

WHEN TO SPRAY.

It has been stated that nearly all of the larvae or worms enter the apple by the calyx end. So that if we can place poison in this part before they enter we can kill them. In observing the growth of the young apple, it has been noticed that the little leaflets that form the calyx remain open for about ten days after the blossoms fall. At the end of this time they close up. If then we are to get the poison into the calyx, the spraying must be done within ten days after the blossoms fall. Then when the calyxes close, the poison will be safe inside ready for the Moth. A few larvae worms however, enter through the side and to catch these a second spraying should be done from 10 to 14 days after the first.

Although the Codling Moth is doing so much damage, it can be easily controlled and at small expense. The secret of success is to be found however in spraying thoroughly at the right time and with the proper solutions.

Telephone and telegraph companies are experiencing trouble. The New York connections of both the C. P. R. and G. N. W., companies were out of working order for several hours.

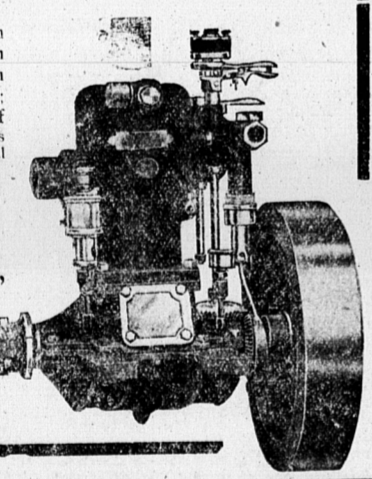
