U. S. PATENT OFFICE STATISTICS. From the recent report of the U. S. Commissioner of Patents, it appears there were received in the last fiscal year 55,352 applications for mechanical patents, 2,292 applications for designs, 91 applications for reissues, 1,610 caveats, 1,861 applications for trade marks, 612 applications for labels, and 112 applications for prints. There were 23,550 patents granted, including reissues and designs; 1,406 trade marks, 372 labels, and 76 prints were registered. The number of patents that expired was 16,670. The number of allowed applications which were by operation of law forfeited for non-payment of the final fees was 4,021. The total receipts of the Office were \$1,209,554.88; total expenditures were \$1,148,663.48, and the surplus of receipts over expenditures, being the amount turned into the Treasury, was \$60,891.40. Current work. On the 27th, of June, 1899, every examiner had his new work within one month of date of filing and his amended work within fifteen days of date. This is the first time since December 1899, when the present form of a weekly reports has or could have been made.
