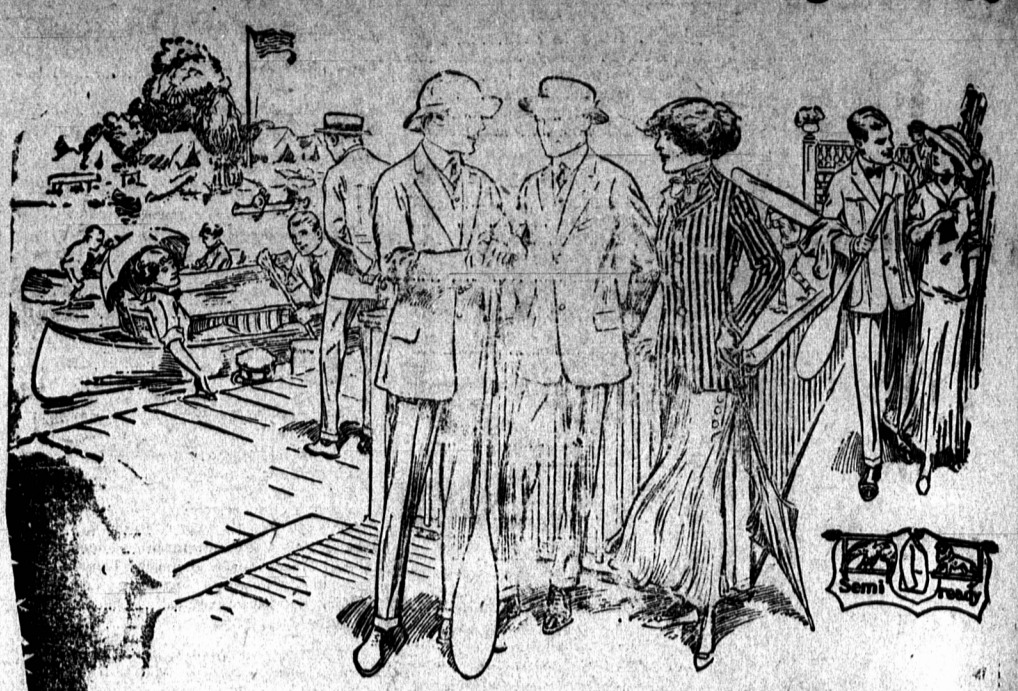
INTERESTED IN FOXES.—Mr. James E. Compton, the treasurer of the New Glasgow and P. E. Island Silver Fox Company of 201 Devonshire St. Boston has been on a visit to the Island for the purpose of making first hand inquiries with the present position and prospects of the Fox Industry. Mr. Compton visited many of the ranches and interviewed ranchers and others interested, and is fully persuaded that prospects were never better than at present. He found a spirit of optimism prevalent everywhere, the general opinion being that the demand for options would be greater than the supply, which must necessarily tend to en-

OF LOCAL INTEREST.—Mr. Franklin Heald, Principal of Hopkins Academy who was in the Province last summer conducting classes at the Summer School for Teachers, has been appointed to the staff of the office of the Experiment Station, Washington, U. S. A. Mr. Heald is at present one of the leading members of the Commission on the Reorganization of Secondary Education. When he went to Hopkins Academy the fact that took his attention particularly was that a great number of boys dropped out before they completed the course. On this account, he recommended vocational work introducing an agricultural department for the boys and household arts for the girls. Hopkins Academy under Mr. Heald has achieved a very wide representation and is now regarded as one of the most up-to-date institutions in the Eastern States. Its aim as set forth by its late Principal, are first, general community service; secondly, broad culture and an interest in the best things so as to continue these in after years; thirdly, college preparation, not to include the extreme types. Mr. Heald is now to plan for the teaching of agriculture in the rural schools of the State of Wisconsin. A lot of his work will be done at Washington.
